MUNICIPAL. THE CRESCENT CITY PARK-THE CARROLLTON RAILROAD.

With the most gigantic jowl, the framework of a few of which "sits" would crowd out the accumulated bones in the catacombs of Rome, the Times comes out anon as the original and champion advocate of the improvement of our up-town park, whilst for a year or more the Democrat has been agitating the question of the improvement of both our parks.

Among the propositions that have been made there was a bill which was introduced in the Legislature, but died stillborn in the chaos of bills of local nature that were presented to our law-makers. The proposition was backed by the Carrollton Railroad Company and the Crescent City Railroad Company, both of which have an interest in the amelioration of the park and the consequent improvement of its vicinity.

At about a quarter to 4 o'clock last evening a fire broke out in the rear portion of the one-story frame building located on Goodchild street, between Marigny and Mandeville streets. The building, which was owned by Mrs. Mary Barcos, and by her occupied jointly with Mr. Gonzales, was damaged to the amount of \$125. The house and furniture was covered by \$2000 insurance to the Merchants Mutual Insurance Company.

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THE CRESCENT CITY RAILROAD.

In connection with the park question it should be said that upon some plan of government being adopted and carried out the Crescent City Railroad Company depended in a measure to smooth and settle its difficulties with the city, which are at all events apparent, at least, in a good way of being leveled. In committee of the whole the Council, so we understand, has authorized Administrator Houston to make, on behalf of the city, a proposition counter to that offered by the Railroad Company, and which has already been published in the Democrat.

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SUICIDE.

Chas. F. Barry Poisons Himself and Gives His Reasons in a Letter. At 11:30 o'clock yesterday morning, a man named Chas. F. When the deceased made up his mind to destroy himself, it was not his first attempt, as on Christmas day, 1878, he swallowed a lot of poison, and his life was saved by Dr. Lewis.

Yesterday Dr. Chopin, president of the New Orleans Board of Health, telegraphed to all cities, through the Associated Press, that such rumors were entirely without foundation.
