The new Congress would certainly repeal the law. Indeed, the Democrats might go further, as it is said they contemplate going to abolishing all the arbitrary and obnoxious Federal laws that grew out of the civil war, and were passed to keep the Republican party in power. It is about time to restore the country to the old constitutional views and practice of the government. We have, since 1861, departed a long way from those landmarks of freedom, civil rights and local self-government which the fathers and patriots of former times established and cherished, and have gone far to assimilate the government of our republic to the centralized governments of monarchial Europe.

The Republican newspapers, as a matter of course, cry out against this proposed action of the Democrats, and have a great deal to say about appending to an appropriation bill matters not involving the expenditures of money, but this comes with a bad grace from a party which has been in the habit of loading down such bills with amendments not at all germane to them. We think the House of Representatives will do well to put the screws to the Republican majority of the Senate in the matter of repealing the test oath law. The war has been long enough to bury the obnoxious measures pertaining to it, and to make no further distinction between citizens.
