Bonds designated Class B, not to exceed \$956,000, in sums of \$1000, No. 1 to 514, same date and maturity, bearing interest payable January 1 and July 1, at the rate of 5 per cent per annum (renewable at same rate).

Bonds designated Class C, not to exceed

Bonds designated Class C, not to exceed \$1,000,000, \$1000, No. 1 to 459, dated January 1, 1876, thirty years, bearing interest payable January 1 and July 1, at the rate of 2 per cent per annum for the first five years and 4 per cent per annum thereafter (renewable at 5 per cent).

The debt of this State, including indorsements, was in 1876 about \$23,000,000. For a portion of this (about \$7,000,000) the act authorizes the issue of new bonds, class A, most of it dollar for dollar at a reduced rate of interest, ignoring the past due unpaid interest. For another portion (\$1,192,000) new bonds, class B, are offered at one-half (\$306,000). For \$5,300,000, indorsement of Alabama and Chattanooga Railroad bonds, new bonds, class C, for \$1,000,000, are offered. For \$2,000,000, issued to Alabama and Chattanooga Railroad company are offered in settlement. Another portion of the old debt, \$1,000,000, are receivable for taxes. For the remaining \$6,000,000 and over no provision is made.—[Mobile Register, twenty-first instant.
