Missouri proposes to imitate the example of Georgia in the matter of issuing anti-refunding bonds, bearing a low rate of interest. A bill authorizing the issue of such bonds was offered in the Missouri Legislature some time ago, but was tabled by that body under belief that the issue of bonds of this character would be unconstitutional.

The negro exodus question is exciting the attention of Congress, no less than four bills having been already presented bearing on this subject. Senator Ingalls wants to give the negro emigrants in Kansas \$100,000 to relieve their distress; Garfield has offered a similar bill in the House, while Windom, in the Senate, and Whitthorne, in the House, propose committees to investigate the matter and inquire into the causes of this movement.

The Republican Ticket.

ALBANY, April 21. - There is no longer any reserve among the Republican leaders here as to their campaigning intentions. Even Mr. Wadsworth is in his decision to the plan, which is: Grant to hail from Illinois, and Don Cameron, of Pennsylvania, for nomination as President and Vice President at a convention in June, 1880; and also ex-Secretary Hamilton Fish for Governor.

Eastern trout do not thrive in the waters of California. All the coast streams have been stocked with them, but they soon died out. FORTY-SIXTH CONGRESS.

PASSAGE OF THE ARMY BILL IN THE SENATE WITHOUT AMENDMENT.

Continuation of the Political Debate in the House - Ewing Effectually Disposes of Garfield.

WASHINGTON, April 25. - Mr. Conkling presented a concurrent resolution from the New York Assembly, declaring it to be the duty of the House of Representatives to refuse appropriations for the maintenance of the government, except upon the condition of a repeal of laws upon the statute books. The resolution was ordered to be printed and laid on the table.

By Mr. Ferry: A bill to authorize the building of a bridge across the Detroit river. Referred.

By Mr. Harris of Virginia: A bill as a substitute for the epidemic disease bill, which he said he would call up for consideration as soon as the army bill was disposed of.

By Mr. Voorhees: A joint resolution to authorize the purchase of a picture of Daniel Webster, by the House of Representatives, and to direct the artist to paint him as signing the Ashburton treaty.

By Mr. Morgan: To amend section 5440 of the Revised Statutes.

Mr. Wallace's resolution to repeal the Senate ratifying Senate appointments then came up, and a vote was taken on Mr. Edmunds' amendment, providing that no soldier shall be removed without cause, such removal to be approved by the President, and reserving his objection by a vote of 25 to 31.

Mr. Carpenter moved to amend by adding to the end of the resolution a proviso, that no office made vacant by the removal of a Union soldier be filled by an ex-Confederate. Led by a vote of 26 to 34.

The resolution as amended was then adopted by a vote of 33 to 26.

It provides that officers shall be appointed into the duties required of them, and shall be acceptable to a majority of the Senate, and that they may be removed and appointed at the option of the Secretary and Sergeant-at-Arms.

Mr. Eaton, rising to a personal explanation, said that some of the newspapers had published a statement to the effect that the Committee on Foreign Relations have under consideration the subject of the act of the journeying of a distinguished citizen, Gen. Grant, to the State of Oregon.

On motion of Mr. Eaton this amendment was tabled - 40 to 28.

Mr. Blaine read a dispatch received by E. W. Mackey, Assistant District Attorney of the State of Georgia, in which he stated that the Barwell election disturbance had been dismissed on a technicality, namely - that the limitation charged had not been on account of color or previous condition of servitude.
