The only way in which more than that number can be made in succession within that space is by sending one or both balls out and bringing them back again. A slight change is also made in respect to frozen balls, the player having the option of playing at a chishon and returning upon either of the object balls first, or of playing from within the "string" at balls spotted.

These new rules tend in a great measure to equalize the chances of the several contestants. Tammany Hall has been carefully arranged for the tournament, with raised seats. There will be twenty-sight games played between eight experts. The players are Jacob Schaefer, of Chicago, who now holds the last tournament emblem, and who is the acknowled master of rail play; George F. Slosson, who is a fillen of Schaefer and Eugene Carter. The games will be 300 points up, on the Collender combination-cushion table. One game will be played each atternoon, beginning to-morrow, and "Yank" Adams will be present each atternoon and give exhibitions of his skill as a finger-billiardist on a special table. It is said Slosson has made a run of 335 points at this game in practice, but as this is the first tournament under these rules there are no records as yet in it.
