From each of the four arms of the chandelier, in the center of the table, was a large oval-shaped cluster of jacquemont roses, with floral streamers, extending to near each end and the side of the table, intertwining, in graceful lines, around the bases of the candelabras, which were surrounded red lace shades.

From each corner of the table, following the streamers, overhead, extended rows of silver forks and spoons, while here and there, were placed beautiful cut glass dishes, containing olives, pickles, assorted salted nuts and bonbons.

The supper, served by Poindexter, Cleveland's leading caterer, was done in his usual matchless style, and consisted of cold ham and tongue, chicken salad, lettuce sandwiches of heart-shape, brown bread sandwiches of crescent design, coffee, Neapolitan ice cream, and assorted cakes.

After the feast, dancing was indulged in, until late (or early) hour.

During the evening, at the request of Mrs. and Miss Hall, Mr. Harvey Williams sang several very beautiful selections to the delight of all. It was the consensus of all that Mr. Williams never appeared to better advantage; and he was warmly congratulated.
