

HANN'S LINE OF DEFENSE

TESTING TO PROVE THAT HUSSEY WAS A DANGEROUS MAN.

Nearly Everybody Late at the Court of General Sessions—Lawyer Howe Doing the Questioning for the Prisoner—Hussey Did Not Expect to Die on the Day After the Shooting—Mrs. Hussey in Court.

ATE seemed the word at the Court of General Sessions this morning. Judge Cowing was five minutes behind, but he had had a clean shave, and doubtless had tarried in the chair of the manipulator of the lathering brush and razor.

He apologized to the court and jury that he had been detained by important business in Judge Gildersleeve's court.

Edward Hahn, the prisoner at the bar, was the only one of the chief actors to respond promptly to the first call bell. He was in his place, though he had a clean shave, wore fresh linen, and had been detained over night.

Mrs. Jack Hussey and the wife of her son, Cornelius Hussey, sat in the apartment set apart for ladies, and another woman had found a seat there also.

The ex-farmer of Capt. Williams' old headquarters, had seen Capt. Hussey four times in his life. Mr. Howe wanted to prove that Jack Hussey had once led a mob of rioters, carrying a red flag, and instigated them to kill the people of this city, but Judge Cowing would not permit this.

Police Capt. Brooks was called, and Mr. Howe asked: Was Jack Hussey held by the police on your conviction to be a dangerous man? and Capt. Brooks responded: "His reputation for ferocity and violence was bad."

Frank Leonard, a fireman for the past fifteen years, was a patient at the Gouverneur Street Hospital while Jack Hussey was there.

By Mr. Howe—What conversation did you have with Hussey? A. I asked Hussey how he was. He said he had taken the pills for me. I said: How was the morning after the shooting?

Patrick McNamara, bar keeper at 6 West street, testified that Hussey drank at his bar the morning before the shooting.

By Mr. Howe—Did you see Hussey but a negro's head with his arm? [Excused.]

Q. Was Hussey drunk? A. I couldn't say whether he was or not. He had a drink.

Q. Well, I've had a drink this morning; how do I appear? A. I couldn't say you were drunk. I couldn't swear you were sober.

This caused a ripple at the expense of the counsel, in which he joined.

Leonard related that he saw Hussey leave the ward with nothing but a blanket on and a counterpane thrown about his shoulders. Hussey could not read, and Leonard read the accounts of the shooting to him from the World.

By Mr. Howe—What did he say about going out? A. On the morning of the 29th of June (Monday), I told him I was going out of the hospital. He said: "I will wait for you on Wednesday and I will go out with you."

Q. What did Hussey say? A. I saw him eat beefsteak, bananas, oranges, pears, toast and cherries.

Witness had been warned not to go out of the warm room into the hall, which was quite cool, and that was where Hussey went.

Cross-examining, Col. Fellows said: Q. You say on Monday, June 18, Hussey said he would call at your house on Wednesday? A. Yes, Mr. Howe.

Q. You knew he died on Tuesday, don't you? A. (Smilingly) Yes, sir.

Col. Fellows testified: That's all.

Edward H. Mullen, a reporter, was called to relate what Dr. O'Hanlon had said to him about Hussey's wound, but this was excluded as hearsay. Col. Fellows calling attention to Mr. Howe's promise to call all the physicians at Gouverneur Street Hospital. To this Mr. Howe retorted:

The Grain Market.
