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DEMOCRATIC VICTORY.

Cook's Plurality for Secretary of State 18,245.

Corrected Figures and Results of Yesterday's Election.

Col. Fellows's Vote Unexpectedly Heavy Downward and on the East and West Sides—Effect of the Falling Off in the George Vote—Contests in Close Districts—What Comparisons with Last Year Show.

There are only a few corrections to be made in the results of the city vote as given in the latest extra edition of the Evening World last night. The complete returns show that Col. Fellows's plurality is larger than it was estimated to be. He polled an unexpectedly heavy vote downward and on the east and west sides of the city, as a glance at the figures by Assembly districts will show. The falling off in the vote of the Labor party had much to do with Col. Fellows's election. There is no doubt that he received the votes of two-thirds of the men who voted for George for Mayor last year, but who did not support the land tax advocate for Secretary of State this year. The Republicans who enlisted in the Labor party appear to have deserted it for the Democratic party. Col. Fellows received the support of the German Republicans and also those of the Socialist Republicans. It is thought that the Progressive Labor party gave Col. Fellows at least 5,000 votes. Mr. Nicoll polled a heavy vote in the Seventh, Ninth, Tenth, Eleventh, Thirteenth, Seventeenth, Nineteenth, Twentieth, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Assembly districts. The Republicans did not cast their full vote for him in these districts, thousands refusing to support either Col. Fellows or Mr. Nicoll. Then many Republicans voted for Col. Fellows because they had a personal acquaintance with him. Mr. Nicoll, however, got a flattering Democratic vote in the up-town districts, as it was predicted he would in THE EVENING WORLD.

THE VICTORY IN THE STATE.

It Looks as Though the Democrats Had a Plurality of 18,000.

Corrected returns from figures since last night come in slowly, but despatches to THE EVENING WORLD indicate pretty clearly that the Democratic State ticket has a plurality of 18,000. The Labor vote was astonishingly small considering the claims made for it, while the Prohibitionists surpassed the most favorable expectations.

RESULTS IN HUDSON COUNTY.

Five Democrats and Five Republicans Sent to the New Jersey Assembly.

Hudson County polled the largest vote of years yesterday, the total being over 90,000. Alderman Robert Davis is elected Sheriff. The vote was: Davis, 11,298; Cronan, 11,248; Allen, 11,176; Lamb, 11,176; Davis's plurality, 2,875.
