

HELPING THE BOYCOTTERS.

MEETING OF THE READING RAILROADERS AT POTTSVILLE.

Reading men again asked to leave the Lehigh Valley and the Central Railroad of New Jersey severally. A committee appointed to confer with President Corbin-Nearly \$1,000 for the miners.

POTTSVILLE, Nov. 22.—Representative railroaders of the Reading system to the number of fifty, covering the territory from Philadelphia to Shamokin, including the Panther Creek Valley, the middle Lehigh and Schuylkill region, assembled in this city yesterday. They were met jointly by National District Assembly No. 134, Divisions 12 and 14 of the same.

The meeting was organized by the election of John L. Lee Chairman and Joseph Cahill Secretary. The question of shipments of coal over the Reading system for filling out for the operators and a committee was fully discussed, and definite action taken for a thorough investigation.

He was a good speaker and he soon got a large practice. He served two terms in the United States Senate, and had he not been elected to the Florida Senate he would have been in the Senate chamber, and he was one of those Senators who keep one eye always upon the gallies of the world.
