MR. HILL'S LETTERS

Given to the Senate Committee by Rollin M. Squire. Most of Them Formal Notes from Private Secretary Rice.

Their Production Has Been Demanded by the Governor - Letters Acknowledging the Receipt of Epistles from Squire - One Requests the Reinstatement of Ex-Senator Nelson's Brother - Another Introduces a Friend - About the Award of Contracts.

The special committee of the State Senate appointed to look into the management of the municipal government, resumed the taking of testimony in Part II. of the Superior Court this morning.

Gov. Hill said to a World reporter in Albany yesterday that he would demand that Rollin M. Squire produce the letters which the post-politician said he received from the Governor, and Senator Pierce, one of the Democratic members of the committee, received a despatch from Gov. Hill asking him to oblige Squire through the committee to produce the letters.

The letters were duly demanded and produced this morning. The court-room was well filled. Among the spectators were Supervisor Thomas Conroy, of the City Record, ex-Comptroller Leow, Aqueduct Commissioner Ridgeway, City Judge Ehrlich, ex-Senator Gibbs, ex-Judge Dittenhofer and Joseph E. Newberger, and ex-Warden Johnson, of the Tombs.

Gen. Tracy was assisted as counsel for the committee by A. B. Boardman, a partner of Ross T. Co. Boardman in the law firm of Macfarlane, Boardman & Co., 115 Broadway, and John O'Brien, of O'Brien & Clark, was "in court" with A. P. Lovatt, of Tarrytown, as counsel.

Comptroller Spencer, of the Aqueduct Commission, was first recalled to the stand. He related at length the story of his unsuccessful effort to persuade Gov. Hill to veto the Callan bill representing the Aqueduct Board.

He then told about the award of the contract for section 12 of the new aqueduct. It was given to O'Brien & Clark, the fourth lowest bidder, in accordance with the recommendation of the engineers, Mayor Grace alone opposing.

The contract for section 13 was awarded to John Brunton & Co., the lowest bidder, at \$1,000,000. The second lowest was O'Brien & Clark, at \$1,000,000. The third lowest was Brunton & Co. were lowest, at \$619,115, and both firms are now bankrupt or in the hands of a receiver.
