

RAVAGING STORMS.

They Carried Terror and Loss Over a Wide Course.

A Beautiful But Destructive Display of Celestial Fireworks.

Smoking Rains and High Winds Allied with the Electric Forces—Panic Carried into the Crowds at the States Island Shows—Lives Lost on the Water—Stories of Damage in New Jersey—Telegraph Wires and Railroads Disturbed.

This morning the effects of last night's storm became very appreciable as reports came in of the damage and loss inflicted all along its course.

The display of celestial fireworks was brilliant and beautiful as it occurred, but its beauty could hardly compensate for its destructiveness.

Three Kinty's was rehearsing 400 boys for the coming "Fall of Rome." Rome fell prematurely during the rehearsal, and St. George is littered to-day with the debris of the ancient city of canvas and stretchers and paint.

A score of the boys were caught in the falling scenery, and one man and several of the boys were slightly hurt. The scenery in preparation for the "Fall of Rome" was torn into kindling wood and shreds.

Two thousand people assembled to witness Buffalo Bill's "Wild West," got drenched to the skin. The show was broken up, and even Buffalo Bill himself, who tried to make a speech, was followed down by the storm.

To add to the discomfort the railroad was washed out and the fence which surrounded last year's "Fall of Babylon" was blown upon the track, forcing a delay of several hours.

Capt. David Loper, of the Pavonia Yacht Club, was out for a sail in his yacht Needles, with a party consisting of Victor Shields, Frank Bismarck, Richard Fringie and two others. They were capsized a little below Liberty Island. They yelled lustily for help as they clung to the bottom of the overturned boat for half an hour.

The report probably spread from this side of the earth was seething with color. When the storm had stopped the temperature was only 49 degrees. The wind was south all through this section during the storm.

To-day we were promised cooler, fair weather by Sergt. Dunn, of the United States Signal Station.

It was rumored this morning that the Hotel Brighton at Coney Island and the Sheepshead Bay stables had been struck by lightning and badly burned.

An Evening World reporter called on Traffic Agent Pollock, of the Sea Beach road, who pronounced the rumor untrue.

The report probably spread from the fact that there was a blaze at Bay Ridge, caused by the lightning.

THE STORM IN BROOKLYN. Lightning Hit Several Fires and Knocked a Man Down in His Cellar.

During the severe storm last night lightning struck a chimney on the four-story brick tenement-house 347 Van Brunt street, Brooklyn, completely demolishing it.

A telegraph pole on the southwest corner of Johnson and Westling streets was struck by the lightning and set on fire.

The high wind which preceded the storm blew down an immense tree at the corner of Evans and Little streets, completely blocking the street.

One of the most singular freaks of the lightning occurred at 379 Fulton street. It struck a telephone wire at Charles Oxenham's store and set fire to the window sash.

PRESTIDIGITATION WITH A BAG.
