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A STRIKE ON PUBLIC SCHOOL WORK.

Painters Ordered Out of Twenty-Two Schools on Account of a "Scab" Contractor. A largely attended meeting of the Building Trades Section of the Central Labor Union was held last night, at 145 Eighth street.

CREDENTIALS WERE RECEIVED AND DELEGATES ADMITTED FROM THE ENTERPRISE ASSOCIATION OF SEAMEN, THE HOUSEMITHS' UNION, THE THEATRICAL LABOR CLUB OF MARBLE WORKERS, THE THEATRICAL PROGRESSIVE ASSOCIATION, THE GERMAN FRESKO PAINTERS' UNION, THE GERMAN HOUSING PAINTERS' UNION AND THE WOODWORKERS' ASSOCIATION OF MACHINISTS AND WOODWORKERS.

THE BOARD OF WALKING DELEGATES, HE SAID, HAD ORDERED A STRIKE ON ALL THE WORK TO ENFORCE THE EMPLOYMENT OF UNION MEN, THE PAYMENT OF STANDARD WAGES AND THE NINE-HOUR RULE. THE SECTION INDORSED THE ACTION thus taken, and will call on the Central Labor Union for assistance in making an appeal to the Board of Education to give union men the preference in all school work.
