BEDELL AGAIN UNDER FIRE.

Lawyer Butler Getting Details of the Big Forger's Operations.

The cross-examination of James E. Bedell, the mortgage forger, now appearing as a witness in a suit against one of the banks affected by his operations, was resumed in Supreme Court, Chambers, to-day.

It was conducted by white-haired William Allen Butler, of Butler, Stillwell & Hubbard, in behalf of the Bank of the State of New York.

The direct examination of Bedell tended to show that his principal work had been personal knowledge of the transactions in his department, and Mr. Butler's cross-examination was intended to demonstrate that Shipman, Barlow, Laroque & Choate were careless and blameworthy in the matter, and therefore to be held responsible, rather than the bank which discounted the checks of the firm.

In order to do this the history of each of the twenty-seven checks was called forth in detail.

A Henry D. Sayre check, in payment of a mortgage given to Lawyer Henry for a loan of \$6,000, was assigned to Bedell and was paid. The signature was genuine.

Another check for \$651.60, with the forged endorsement of "A. L. Myers," was the amount of a deposit with the firm to ratify a lien on property offered as security for a loan. Subsequently the lien was paid by Bedell and his firm lost nothing, only the use of the money.

Several similar transactions were unearthed by the cross-examination, which was intended to show that Shipman, Barlow, Laroque and Choate had not lost so much by Bedell's forgeries, and that the Bank of the State of New York was not liable for the whole \$295,000.

JERSEY'S RAILWAY WAR. Temporary Peace Secured by a Midnight Agreement.

Temporary peace is secured between the Lehigh Valley Railway Co. and Jersey City, the company having agreed to restore the grade and repair damages at its crossings in Jersey avenue. This agreement was effected at midnight, the Commissioners being called from their beds to meet the railway people at the scene of trouble.

More war is expected farther down the coast, where certain property is claimed by the two railway companies—the Lehigh Valley and the Central Railroad of New Jersey.

Staten Islets. Thomas Meade, one of the crew of the bark George W. Corbett, was arrested at Stapleton, S. I., for breaking into the cargo and selling sugar to junk dealers.

Andrie Eddy, aged eighty-three, Assessor for Westfield, and James Graham, aged sixty-three, Collector for the same town, both died suddenly last night.

Fell Off the Cab. John Stroude, a cab-driver, of 149 West Thirtieth Street, fell from his cab while turning the corner of Broadway and Thirtieth Street early this morning and struck his head against a pillar of the elevated road, sustaining a fracture of the skull. He was taken to the New York Hospital.

STEWART ESTATE FIGURES. More of Them Made Public Before Surrogate Kausom To-Day.

When the Stewart will hearing was resumed this morning before Surrogate Kausom, Charles J. Mercer, the expert accountant who testified yesterday, made a more detailed statement of the accounts and books of the estate.

Mr. Mercer said that the taxes on the Stewart property, from 1876 to 1886 amounted to \$48,392.56. In 1879 the value of the Park Avenue Hotel was estimated at \$600,000, while in 1887 it was reduced to \$500,000, its present appraised value.

The Magnian Soon to Float Again. The Clyde steamer Saginaw, which filled with water and sank while receiving her cargo at Pier 18, will be refloated by to-morrow.

The Merritt Wrecking Company's tug, J. J. Merritt, was at work all night long pumping the water out of her hold. One of the agents of the Clyde Company said the sinking was caused by lack of ballast and by the cargo being put all on one side.

Lived Long and Died Suddenly. James Wilson, ninety-five years old, died suddenly at the home of his daughter, 534 Greenwich Street, to-day.
