GEN. COCHRANE SELECTED. TAMMANY'S CHOICE FOR PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

A Consultation of the Leaders Held Yesterday—A Moxing and Capable Man Needed for the Board of Estimates and Appropriations—Tammany and the Republicans Expected to Vote Together—Singer's Old Opponent.

It has been definitely settled that Gen. John Cochrane, Chairman of the Tammany Hall General Committee, is to be elected president of the Board of Aldermen.

The determination was arrived at at a consultation held yesterday afternoon between Fire Commissioner Croker, Congressman W. Bourke Cochrane, Gen. Cochrane and other Tammany leaders.

The gentlemen agreed that the Board of Aldermen could fill the vacancy, and proceeded to discuss the question of who should be the Tammany candidate.

Gen. Cochrane, who was selected, was Tammany Hall's candidate for the same position in 1884, and was defeated by Adolph L. Sanger, who was again the candidate of the County Democracy this year.

It is probable that the Republican members of the present Board of Aldermen will vote with Tammany to place him in the President's chair.

The Board of Aldermen met to-morrow, but inasmuch as the funeral of the late President Foster occurs on the same day, it is not probable that the vacancy will be filled until the next ensuing meeting.

An Engineer Says the Million and a Half Gallons Bank Into a Conveyance, and That the Damage \$50,000—Nothing but a Wasteful Abyss is Left in the Basin Now.

Roanoke, Va., Nov. 12.—The loss on the reservoir from which the bottom mysterious sank Saturday night is \$50,000.

There were 1,200,000 gallons of water in the reservoir Saturday evening. Now there is nothing but a yawning abyss to be seen.


