"Brother Ed Murphy—Razzle-dazzle is a nineteenth century slang expression that in the eighteenth used to mean full as a boiled egg. It is a short order, and means 'I am somewhat screwed,' which is English, you know. Lawyer William F. Howe—When a fellow has got bottles of lightning in his brain and can't get it out I guess he is razzle-dazzled. Broder E. Livermore—When you have been to a dinner where Dr. Chanancy Dewey has made several of his brilliant speeches, and have partaken too freely of solid and liquid good cheer, you are apt to awake the next day, feeling decidedly razzle-dazzled. Alderman Barry—I see people are using the term instead of "boycock." But I don't think it means just that. Assistant District Attorney Dawson—Now you have got me. I don't know. I might make a guess, but you had better ask some younger man. Assistant District Attorney Lindsay—Razzle-dazzle means a good old-fashioned drunk. Lawyer John Graham—Never heard of the expression before, but suppose it means something like hocus-pocus. I mean to look it up. Clerk Sparks, of the Criminal Courts—I suppose when a man is on a lark he is razzle-dazzled. Actor Murphy, who created the razzle-dazzle craze—One night after the theatre, after I had sung my razzle-dazzle song, I imbibed a little too much razzle-dazzle juice, and went along Broadway singing the song. I was run in and fined \$10. I was razzle-dazzled. Lawyer Fred Brown—When a man is somewhat under the influence, he usually feels razzle-dazzled. TRACES OF POISON. And a Young Wife's Intimation That There Was Robbery. These Make the Mystery Following John Emmerich's Death.

The Case to Be Investigated by the Coroner and the Police. AN EVENING WORLD reporter called this morning at 88 Willett street upon the young widow of John Emmerich, whose sudden death the coroner is now investigating, indications of poisoning having been found in the dead man's stomach. Emmerich was walking along Division street with his newly made wife yesterday afternoon when he suddenly fell in what seemed to be a fit. An ambulance carried him to Governor Hospital, and he died a short time afterward. Mrs. Emmerich is a pretty brunette of perhaps twenty-one years. Tears stood in her eyes as she told her story to the reporter. She and Emmerich were children together in a little town in Hungary. Eight years ago when John was seventeen and she was about thirteen, he left home and came to America. He was strong and energetic and upon arriving in the new country he went West. He located in Cleveland, O., and began to work at his trade, that of a tinmith. The two lovers kept up a constant correspondence, and four years ago Rosa, for that was her name, followed her lover across the sea. She settled down in New York, where she secured a situation in an uptown mansion. John came East several times to visit his sweetheart, and finally they became engaged. A month ago John put his business affairs in condition and came to New York. Rosa had left her situation uptown and went to live at her sister's home, in Willett street. Saturday last was the day set for the wedding, and the couple went to the Polish church in Forsyth street and were married by Rabbi Klimecky. The newly married couple then made arrangements to go to Cleveland. Two railroad tickets were purchased and they were to leave last night. "We started out yesterday morning to make a parting call on my aunt, in Jackson street," said Mrs. Emmerich. "Before leaving I handed my husband \$20, money that I had saved, and asked him to carry it for me. He placed it with other money in a ready pocketbook, which he tucked carefully away in his inside coat pocket. "We left my aunt's house about 2 o'clock. At the corner of Division and Montgomery streets he fell in a fit. He was carried to the Governor Hospital and I followed. When I arrived there and asked to see my husband, they told me he was not there. I couldn't see him, they said, as he was dying. "The man whom I saw told me to come around at 4 o'clock after an operation had been performed on him. I had a friend with me, and we went to the hospital. I went back to my aunt's house and found my husband dead. They handed me a pair of white gloves, a memorandum book, his wedding ring and a pocket watch. "My husband had over \$20 of his own money, and with the \$20 I gave him he had over \$40 in his pocket. When I demanded the return of the money he told me he had spent everything they found on him. He couldn't have lost the money. He didn't spend any while we were out." Mrs. Emmerich said further that she intended visiting Police Headquarters and asking for an investigation. She didn't believe that her husband had taken poison. He was always jolly and made friends with all who came near him. He had an enemy in the world, and had no cause to take his own life. The reporter next called at the Governor Hospital at 10 o'clock. "I was present when Mrs. Emmerich came in. She did not seem to be excited, but wanted to go to her husband's room. I went with her. She was in, we persuaded her to go home. "I was in the room when the man's clothing was searched, and can say that no such pocketbook was found as she describes. There was a pair of money that he had when brought in here were given to her." House Surgeon McNameara said: "If his wife claims that he has \$40 in his pocket, I can't help it. I didn't find it on him. Thirty-eight cents was all." Clerk C. Wilson gave the following inventory of the property found on the man: A watch, a pair of gloves, a pair of white gloves, a photograph of himself and wife, a lead pencil, white necktie, pair of white kid gloves, memorandum book containing memoranda, a gold ring and a gold stud. Ambulance Surgeon F. Peitler said: "The list given you by Clerk Wilson is correct. I was present at the examination and I know. His finger took his death very coolly. When we told her he was dead she said: 'Is that so?' and immediately went to work to get the property found on him. "The case will be analyzed by a chemist. The traces found were those of arsenic poisoning."

BOSTON'S TRAGEDY. The Death of Edward Coburn and His Wife. Was Murder Included or Was It a Double Suicide?

Coburn's Queer Statement on a Newspaper Margin. (SPECIAL TO THE EVENING WORLD.) BOSTON, March 1.—A startling tragedy occurred at 283 Highland street, Roxbury, last night. On the third floor of the above number lived Edward Coburn, twenty-eight years old, and his wife, Elizabeth, who was eighteen years old. With them resided Coburn's mother, who is very old. Coburn was a drummer. On the 23d of last July the young couple were married. She was a Catholic and bore the maiden name of Elizabeth Tirrell. Coburn was a Protestant. It is said that the pair have not lived happily together and that there was almost constant quarrelling. No reason was known for this except their religious differences, which was not a serious matter. It is claimed that Mrs. Coburn has been subject to hysterical attacks, during which she has threatened to commit suicide. Last evening about 5 o'clock she came downstairs to the front door, her husband following her. When they reached the first floor they met Mrs. Ellison, who occupies that floor. Mrs. Ellison says Coburn said to her: "I want you to witness that I do not use any violence towards my wife. I simply want her to go back upstairs or tell me what she is going to do." Then they both went upstairs together. Soon after the report of a pistol was heard, and Coburn rushed excitedly out, saying to the neighbors that he was going for a doctor. Coburn's mother soon followed and went to a neighbor's house, where she said her daughter-in-law had shot herself. The neighbors called and found the house where Coburn lived they found the woman lying on her face dead. Under and on the right side of her chin was a bullet hole, from which the blood was flowing. Coburn had not returned and was not heard of till 8.45 o'clock. At that hour a boy came into the house and said that a man was dead on the roof of the Madison Square Hotel, an apartment-house on the corner of Warwick and Sterling streets. He proved to be Coburn. He had two bullet-holes just between his eyes. He evidently intended instant death, but he did not expire until three hours afterward. He had in his pocket a copy of a Boston paper, and on the margin he had written these words: "This is the outcome of a villainous life. I am a warning to others." "Oh! God people, don't lay any blame on my goodly mother. It is my disobedience to her that has done this. Will some one buy me a revolver just between his eyes. A .38-calibre revolver by his side, with three chambers empty, told the purpose for which it had been used. The other Mrs. Coburn states that when she entered the room after the shots were fired the young woman was lying on the floor in the same position as when found. The revolver was by her side. Her son approached her, picked up the corpse, and rushed out. She does not believe he killed his wife. Whether he did or not will probably forever remain a mystery."

NOLAN GUILTY OF MURDER.

THE JURY TOOK NO STOCK IN HIS DEFENSE OF INSANITY. Assistant District Attorney Goff consumed the entire forenoon in summing up before Justice Cowing, in General Sessions, for the people in the case of James Nolan, who murdered his mistress, Emma Bush, last November. He argued that the murder was coolly deliberated and carried out by the accused, and that the plea of insanity and temporary illusions had not been established by the defense. Mr. Goff finished summing up at 12.45. Judge Cowing then charged the jury, reviewing the evidence in the case and defining the law as it affected the case. He finished his charge at 1.45. The jury then retired. They were out an hour and a quarter. It was just 5 o'clock when Judge Cowing was notified that they had agreed on a verdict, and ordered them to be brought into court. Nolan, who had been talking to his counsel, started eagerly to his feet in his excitement. "We find the prisoner guilty of murder in the first degree," said the foreman, and Judge Cowing promptly remanded Nolan for sentence and adjourned the Court. He seemed much affected and staggered down the aisle, giving a tear from his cheek. Unseated Railroad Lungs Are Forfeited. (SPECIAL TO THE EVENING WORLD.) WASHINGTON, D. MISSING CLEVELAND. The Absent Seedman Was Last Seen in St. Louis. A Consultation of the Company's Officers Held To-Day.

A Story that He Was Defendant in a Conspiracy Case. Considerable excitement was manifested in downtown business circles this morning by the report of the mysterious disappearance of A. B. Cleveland, President of the A. B. Cleveland Company (Limited), a large seed house at 47 Corland street. Although Mr. Cleveland has been missing for five weeks, the fact was not made public until this morning, and grave rumors of a defalcation have arisen in consequence.
