## END OF AN ELOPEMENT.

Pearson Is in the Tombs and the Combination Is Off.

Frank E. Pearson, who is a prisoner in the Tombs on the charge of appropriating \$500 which Mrs. Wakefield, the divorced wife of the late millionaire, Cyrus W. Wakefield, is alleged to have given him to pay the interest on two mortgages on two houses in West One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, will be brought to trial to-morrow.

Pearson was riding master at Draper & Hall's academy, in Boston, six years ago. Mrs. Wakefield, it is said, fell in love with him, and the two made frequent visits out of town together. In April, 1885, Wakefield learned of his wife's capers and instituted divorce proceedings, in which Pearson was co-defendant. Mrs. Wakefield made no defense, and the case went by default. Mrs. Wakefield and Pearson then went to live together, as it is said, living in one of the two houses on One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street which Mrs. Wakefield had purchased.

Then they began to quarrel, and the charge of appropriating the \$500 is the result. Mr. Wakefield died recently, but his wife cannot claim any of his money.

Pearson says he can clear himself, and promises sensational developments.

Investigating the Hoboken Forgeries. The Council Committee appointed to investigate the forgeries of Defaulter William Maussell, the Assistant City Clerk of Hoboken, is still at work at the City Hall on the examination of the "check books." The face value of forged checks so far examined amount to \$9,091.87. Maussell is still in the County Jail and remains mum.

In Aid of a Poor Cripple. Coroner Levy has received \$2,000 from Mrs. Harris Cohen, of 130 White street, for the blind cripple, Charlie Brins, whom the Coroner succeeded in having released from the Tombs, where he was confined for peddling matches. The case was brought to the public notice by THE EVENING WORLD, and is a most deserving one.
