

MORONEY ARRESTED.

John J. Moroney and Charles McDonald in Custody Here. Accused of Being the Actual Murderers of Dr. Cronin.

The Chicago Police Ordered Them Arrested in a Cipher Despatch.

Inspector Byrnes Has Them Locked Up at Police Headquarters.

Inspector Byrnes to-day arrested two prominent Irishmen in this city on a charge of being concerned in the murder of Dr. Cronin.

One of the prisoners is John J. Moroney, everywhere known as a member of the Clan-na-Gael, and mentioned in Dr. Cronin's papers as one of the men whom Alexander Sullivan tried to force into the Convention as a delegate for a district to which he did not belong.

The second prisoner is Charles McDonald, who has long been a zealous worker in the Clan-na-Gael.

Orders for the arrest of the men came from the Chicago authorities, and despatches from that city state that the prisoners are believed to be the two men who rented the cottage to which Dr. Cronin was lured and who actually did the murder.

Inspector Byrnes has for the past forty-eight hours been watching these men and after receiving by telegraph to Chicago he received this morning the following despatch. It was in cipher, and translated was as follows:

Arrest M. and Mc. Proof of connection with murder of Dr. Cronin. Will send officers and papers immediately. J. M. Moraney, State's Attorney. G. M. McDonald, Superintendent of Police.


