BUT THE CITY OF PARIS MAKES A WONDERFULLY FAST TRIP.

Strong westerly and northwesterly winds, with high head seas, prevented the human liner City of Paris from adding fresh laurels to her matchless racing record.

With a host of noted travellers the big steamer arrived off Sandy Hook at 8.14 this morning and reached her dock a few hours later.

The trip, although not the fastest the steamer has ever made, is, considering the obstacles she had to contend against, a very fast one.

The City of Paris sailed from Queenstown at 11.30 P. M. last Thursday, and, allowing for the stoppage of time, she completed the run to Hook in 7 days, 23 hours and 10 minutes, just three minutes behind her famous May.


