

EXTRA MORE FRAUD.

Lenox Hill Bank's Re-opening Set Back by a Discovery.

\$124,000 MORE SCOOPED IN.

Glaassen Under Examination by Commissioner Shields.

It is now plain sailing for the Sixth National and the Equitable Banks, but the rehabilitation of the Lenox Hill Bank promises to be the toughest job of all.

A startling discovery. The depositors of the Lenox Hill regard this new and startling discovery as a serious set-back to their prospects, and under the assurances of Bank Examiner Covell and President Jordan himself have failed to dispel their apprehensions.

There is no philanthropic gentleman, like Mr. Leland, connected with the Lenox Hill, who will step forward and make up this big deficit out of his own pocket, and it is generally believed that the resources of the Western National Bank are not so absolutely unlimited that it can be relied upon to help them out of their difficulties.

Mr. Jordan acknowledged that the \$124,000 in worthless securities checks is a serious obstacle in the way of a successful reorganization, but proposes to apply as a remedy, courage and collateral.

As a result of his discoveries Mr. Jordan was very busy downtown all the morning, presumably hunting up some one to assume the care of the \$124,000 worth of stocks of the bank still outstanding.

CROKER A VERY SICK MAN.

The Retiring Chamberlain Not Likely Again to Hold Office.

Mayor Grant Not Yet Ready to Appear His Successor.

The resignation of Chamberlain Croker, announced in the Sporting Extra of Tuesday Evening World yesterday, is the subject of talk in every circle to-day, and speculation is rife as to his probable successor.

There can be no question that Mr. Croker is a very sick man, said Commissioner Thomas P. Gilroy. "He has been considering this resignation for a long time, and Mayor Grant has tried to dissuade him."

It was also agreed by the Committee to place the name of Comptroller Theodore W. Myers, of New York, instead of that of William H. Hittcock, and to so change the bill as to limit the Fair site to lands above Eighty-third street.

Senator Saxton is credited with suggesting the amendment limiting the area with which the site may be chosen. He also suggested other amendments, among them being clauses limiting the expenditures of the World's Fair Committee to \$10,000,000, providing that proper notices be served upon all property owners of the intention of the Commissioners to take their property.
