THE CHRONIC WARD.

Only the female insane are treated on Blackwell's Island. The male indigent who goes crazy is sent to Ward's Island. The asylums on these islands are supported by the city, and any one unable to afford a paid retreat is sent to them. A certificate signed by two physicians is all that is necessary to proclaim a person insane and cause him or her to be committed to one of these asylums.
