

THE LAST EDITION. GREAT DAY FOR BOODLERS.

Ex-Aldermen Kirk and Sheila's Indictments Dismissed To-Day.

Col. Fellows Makes No Objection and the Judges Are Willing.

Boodlers Sayles, DeLacy, Keenan, Moloney and the rest, who have been living in exile at Montreal these four years, must feel like kicking themselves just now.

They ran away from indictments for bribery in connection with the Broadway railway franchise of 1884.

And now the public prosecutor for New York County is acquiescing in the dismissal of the indictments against these fellows who didn't run away, and the sky is clearing beautifully over the heads of the ex-Aldermen.

Ex-Alderman Tommy Shields and ex-Prosecutor Board William F. Kirk are the last to be dismissed with the benediction of Col. Fellows.

Recorder Smyth to-day dismissed the indictment against Kirk, and Judge Cowing performed a like office in Shields's case, with the consent of District-Attorney Fellows, who hasn't been able to convict any of the fellows.

The "boodle combine" proper consisted of thirteen Aldermen of the 1884 Board, who met at Alderman McLaughlin's house. They were, according to informers Fullerton and Duffy, Cleary, Reilly, Pullgraf, Duffy, McLaughlin, McQuade, O'Neil, Jaehne, and James A. Deary and Kemp. There were nine others indicted.

Kemp and McLaughlin died, McQuade went crazy, Jaehne and O'Neil are in Sing Sing, McQuade was, but got a new trial. Cleary was tried, the jury disagreeing; Rohm, Dempsey, Sayles and De Lacy ran away.

William M. Ivins to-day finished the bill for the reformation of the Sheriff's Office, and it was taken to Albany for introduction in the Legislature this afternoon.

The bill was submitted to Sheriff Sikes, and met with his entire approval.

Mr. Ivins has regard to the bill in connection with accounts of the bill this morning.

"The theory of the bill is very simple," said he. "In the first place, all money that have heretofore been received by the Sheriff for accounts of services rendered by the Sheriff in actions at law or special proceedings are to be turned into the city treasury."

"Second, in lieu of these fees the Sheriff is to be paid a fixed salary and that of his subordinates as well as his counsel shall be paid a fixed salary."

"The fixed salary of, say, possibly, \$10,000, and a second tier of the profits which he now receives on the appropriations for summing jurors, drawing up a grand jury, and certifying to the same, report convictions, and so on."

"It has been thought best to give him some incentive to see that the work of his office which is really performed, for parties in his office are not to be paid, but to give him the right to receive from the City Treasury a sum equivalent to one-half of the fees."

"This gives him the necessary motive to see that the work is done to the satisfaction of the parties in interest, and that his subordinates are diligent and trustworthy."

Provision is made for a thorough system of accounting to be made to the City Treasury monthly.

The present fee bill is altogether inadequate, and a new one has been agreed upon increasing the charges in most cases—some cases not slightly and in others considerably.

The bill will not go into effect until a new Sheriff is appointed.

Francis Connor Dying from a Dozen Fearful Gashes.

A group of men entered the Fifth street police station at 3.30 o'clock this morning, carrying a heavy burden between them. They laid it down in front of the desk, and the Sergeant in charge, who was a man bathed in blood. There was life in it, for it writhed and groaned.

A hurried message for an ambulance was rung and then the spokesman gave the names of the six as follows:

Joseph Kraemer, 440 East Twelfth street; Joseph Roth, 60 West Sixth street; Joseph Jozek, 341 Ninth street; Frederick Schmidt, 1150 First avenue; John DeForest, 183 Bowery; Benjamin Mulhoo, 80 Eighth street.

He then went on to say that most of them had been together with the wounded man, Francis Connor, of 17 City Hall place, in Philip Green's shoe store, at 440 East Twelfth street all day yesterday, or the greater part of it, drinking beer.

Towards midnight the party felt the need of a little fresh air and started out on a tour of the tenement streets.

Some time after 2 o'clock they found themselves at Eighth street and First avenue. There had been a fight on the way between Connor and Green, and now it broke out in an open row.

Exactly what the trouble was their medical attendants were not in a position to grasp. A fight in a street in which Green had cut out a knife in his pocket, sharp as a razor, and when he ran away he left Connor with a dozen wounds, five deep knife-wounds, one in the shoulder, another in the wrist, and still others in the breast and throat.

These the ambulance surgeon, who had been busy over the man while the latter part of the story was told, said would probably do him. There was not one chance in ten that he would live. He was packed off to Bellevue Hospital with all speed.

Folkman's medicine was sent with the man to Bellevue. His name was easily followed up Avenue A to the corner of 13th street.

Two policemen on the post had seen him busy along, and, reaching up the house 138 East Twelfth street, they saw something under the door after a quick glance around to see if he was alone.

BEATIE IN TANGLE.

Attacked by the Comptroller on Street-Cleaning Preliminaries.

Street-Cleaning Commissioner Beatie's new Medical Examining Board, which was to pass on the physical ability of all applicants for labor in his Department, has already become a bone of contention.

Comptroller Myers sees in the innovation an attack on the treasury and rushes to the defense of the city's strong box.

"Who is going to pay for the services of these medical examiners?" asked he to-day.

"I shall certainly not allow them to be paid from the city treasury, and it would be a hardship to require poor laborers to submit to an examination and make them pay the physician's expenses as a condition precedent on their employment."

The Comptroller said that he had communicated with the Board of Health regarding the payment of his new medical board. He is confident that the Board will be good enough to examine the fees of applicants for work on the street, and will not insist on regular physicians.

The Comptroller's question, who is going to pay for the services of these medical examiners, is a question which will be paid from the appropriation for administration.
