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The General Market Quiet but Stronger.
Silver and Gold Both for European Shipment.

HERE was nothing but Sugar Trust to-day. Everybody had it that the Trust has made its peace with the State and will be reorganized under the New York laws. In that event, it was said, all suits of the State and all litigation would be withdrawn. There is no use disguising the fact that this was created a strong bullish feeling at the opening when the certificates rose over a point to 75%. At the advance, however, there were heavy sales for both the long and short account and a drop to 72% ensued.
It may appear, some of the sales were traced to insiders, and the street is now asking why these parties have been selling if the path of the Trust is about to be cleared of all legal difficulties?
Perhaps in the absence of any official statement from Attorney-General Tabor, it would be well for intending purchasers of Sugar Trust certificates to hold off.
It looks very much to a disinterested spectator as if the insiders were playing the cut-throat game.
At any rate it is safe to assume that when the present campaign in the certificates is over, the insiders will have the cash and the outsiders an increase in their stock of experience.
At least this has been the outcome ever since the certificates were listed. At the close there was a rally to 74%. In the main firm, especially for Pacific Mail and Lackawanna.
Western advices state that railroad officials are elated over the agreement to advance commodity rates. Grain tariffs are only reduced locally from the Missouri River.
A prominent firm of bullion dealers will ship 200,000 ounces of silver to Europe this week.
