

REGOINT TO BEGIN SEPT. 29.

Citizens Must Get Ready for the Biennial Census Enumerators. They Won't Ask Those Offensive Questions Which Were Put by Porter's Men.

The order issued by the Board of Police for a complete house-to-house recount of the population of this city, which will establish the accuracy or otherwise of the alleged census taken three months ago by Porter's partisans, will be put into effect without delay, and the new census will be begun a week from Monday.

The most careful and complete methods will be employed to insure a correct and thorough enumeration of the city's population, and special attention will be given to those densely crowded districts in which the most startling discrepancies have been discovered.

Only select policemen will be detailed to the work. Every precinct will be taken by Inspector Byrne, that the count shall not be performed in a half-hearted or slovenly fashion, and there is no doubt that the men will enter on their mission intelligently and conscientiously.

No important or vexatious questions will be asked, and it is quite certain that while not a single person, man, woman or child will be overlooked, unwelcome receptions, such as slamming the door in their faces, extended to the Federal enumerators are not in store for the enumerating policemen.

It is probable that a conference will be held between the Mayor and Acting Supt. Byrnes some time today.

Acting Supt. Byrnes said today he had not decided upon any method of disposing of the men, as he could, however, put a sufficient number of men at the work without crippling the force.

I shall select men who are intelligent, and each street will be thoroughly canvassed as to the number of the houses taken, with the name of each occupant placed opposite the number.

By rotating the numbers an inaccurate case will be avoided, and the result will be a single visit. We expect every citizen to sit up in his work, and, of course, do not look for any other result.
