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MRS. LILLIAN SCOTFIELD.

Since the tragic death of "Nat" Hatch, who jumped from a rear window of her then residence, Twentieth street and Sixth avenue, and was killed, Mrs. Scofield has changed greatly in appearance.

Her dejected appearance would attract attention anywhere. From her own story she has been divorced from her husband and has assumed the name of Stowell.

The complaint made by Mrs. Winslow is to the effect that she saw a live-in servant in a morning paper, stating that the house and furniture of 120 West Forty-first street, in the market for lease, Mrs. Winslow called at the house, she says, and that Mrs. Scofield, who said the whole could be rented for three years, gave her \$200 monthly in advance, three months to be made during the first year of occupancy.

After considerable talk the purchase price was returned to Mrs. Scofield, and Mrs. Winslow alleges that she at once paid Mrs. Scofield \$200 cash and gave two checks for \$15 each to be paid to her later.

Thinking all was settled, Mrs. Winslow turned the key in the lock and passed to the establishment at all its belongings.

Two hours later Mrs. Scofield passed down the hall to the parlor door, and in a low voice said:

"Come out here."

Mrs. Winslow came in, very uneasy, but unmoved. Again, came the whispered words:

"Come out here. Mrs. Winslow asked: "Why should I come out of here?"

Then came in a loud and imperative voice: "Come out here, I cannot tell you why, but just now, here, something is going on."

"Come here and I will tell you about it."

Mrs. Winslow went in, and Mrs. Scofield, who said she had been waiting for her, came out, and as she reached the hallway Mrs. Scofield stepped to the parlor door and turned the key in the lock and passed to the front door, saying, as she went, "I must lock the house up."

Mrs. Scofield locked up with Mrs. Winslow also on the spot.

Mrs. Scofield had been for Broadway and Mrs. Winslow followed. Here, recovering from her bewilderment at the strange conduct of Mrs. Scofield, she demanded her \$200 and the two checks.

Mrs. Scofield replied:

"I cannot give you your money back."

The same afternoon Mrs. Winslow called on her newly-purchased home, a time satisfied if she got the money back, she demanded the money, when she said:

"I cannot give it to you. I have spent it."

Mrs. Winslow then sought legal advice, and a warrant was issued for Mrs. Scofield's arrest.

In Jefferson Market Police Court this morning Mrs. Scofield complained bitterly at Mrs. Winslow's want for her money, and she said that she had no money to give.

Mrs. Winslow said that on the latter ground she would not now let the place to Mrs. Scofield, and that she still, under her current mortgage, holds a \$10,000 equity on the house.

She demanded an examination and was held. The case will come up this afternoon.

TRIED TO MURDER AN OFFICER.

A BROOKLYN POLICEMAN STRUCK IN THE HEAD WITH AN AXE.

James Moran and a man named Fitzgerald, were locked up in Brooklyn today, on the charge of attempting to murder Policeman D. F. Donohue.

The latter, who had been on duty at the top floor of a building at St. Mark's and Broadway avenues, about 10 o'clock last night, and started on the stairs to visit him.

When he started up the stairs, in the dark, the policeman was felled by a blow with an axe, which struck him in the forehead and knocked him senseless and bleeding.
