JUDGE PRYOR FOR THE "L" AT THE NATION'S CAPITOL.

Surprising Turn of the Tables Against Suits for Damages.

The first decision handed down by Judge Roger A. Pryor since his recent appointment to the bench of the Court of Common Pleas has caused a sensation among owners of property on the line of the L road, who have suits for damages pending or in preparation. The decision was rendered in one of the many suits which are now pending against the Elevated Railway Company, brought by property owners to recover past damages caused by the maintenance and operation of the road. The plaintiffs were Sarah B. Brash and others, who own 441, 443, 445 and 407 Sixth streets and certain houses on Eighth avenue at One Hundred and Sixty-third street, and they asked for damages as well as for an injunction restraining the Company from operating its road in front of their premises.

A great number of these suits have been decided in the past few years, and in nearly every case heavy damages have been recovered from the Company. This has been the case, especially with the more recent actions, and for the last year or so it has been remarked that the courts have been steadily increasing the measure of damages awarded in each successive case.

The most striking feature of Judge Pryor's decision, which is just handed down, is that he not only dismisses the complaint, but in a long opinion, which he has written, he takes the position that the plaintiffs are not entitled to any damages whatever, because their property has been shown to have increased largely in value since the Elevated Road commenced operation, and that, therefore, no damage has been suffered by the property-owners in consequence.

This is a new and very unexpected departure from the precedents established in the courts of this city in a long series of cases of a precisely similar nature, and the lawyers are all very much exercised over it.

In regard to the Sixth avenue property involved in the present action, Judge Pryor says that the comparison of the rental values of the premises in 1878, when the road was opened, with that at the present time, furnishes the only satisfactory solution of the problem. In 1877, he says, the four buildings on Sixth avenue commanded a rental of \$1,500, \$1,200, \$1,000 and \$1,000 respectively, and that in 1890 the rents obtained were \$600, \$500, \$400 and \$400, showing that as the rental value has increased from 180 to 200 per cent, since the opening of the road, the fee value had increased in a corresponding ratio.

"I conclude, therefore, that as to the Sixth avenue property the plaintiffs have shown no injury, but benefit," says Judge Pryor.

As to the Eighth avenue property, it is stated that the evidence shows the rent for the first year the premises were built and occupied in 1878, was \$1,200; for 1880, \$1,000; for 1882, \$1,000; for 1884, \$1,000; for 1886, \$1,000; for 1888, \$1,000; for 1890, \$1,000. Furthermore, it appears that up to 1888, when the property was improved, the corner lot was valued at \$5,000 and the inside lots at \$3,000 each. Today the corner lot is worth from \$17,000 to \$20,000 and the inside lots between \$12,000 and \$14,000.

Judge Pryor says in conclusion: "And yet, I am asked to award plaintiffs thousands of dollars for injuries inflicted on this property by defendant's railroad. To my mind the claim is excessive and unjust."

Hints of Policies and Programmes in Congress.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—The House Appropriations Committee didn't get to work yesterday after all, only three members appearing on deck. It is stated that by to-morrow or Monday Chairman Cannon and his committee will be ready and will work hard enough to make up the lost days.

The estimates for the coming year have been said to show a deficiency in the Pension appropriation of last year of from \$5,000,000 to \$40,000,000. A number of sub-committees seen here, who have copies of the estimates, say this is something of an exaggeration, and that the deficiency is not over \$27,000,000. The exact state of affairs cannot be known until the official figures are given out.

Republican members of Congress are taking a great deal of interest in getting ready for the Democratic state Legislatures under the plan of reappointment, and are arguing the merits of the bill to regulate the forming of the congressional districts to be taken up and passed at the coming session. Mr. McCann says Congress should pass a bill laying out the districts with absolute fairness to both parties and thus prevent gerrymandering by either.

The Democratic members realize the responsibility which will rest with them when the Fifty-second Congress meets, and are already ready to take a program in which proper economy in appropriations and advanced legislation on silver coinage and the tariff figure prominently.
