Falling Crops Have Made Them Scarce and Costly.

The Varieties Offered Us for Consumption This Winter. We Must Eat What We Formerly Turned Up Our Noes At.

Unless they possess plethoric pockets New Yorkers whose palates are partial to apples had better eat oranges this winter.

As a general rule the price paid by city folk for the luscious, juicy apple would make farmers raise their hands in holy horror were they to be charged the same rates that are inflicted upon their city brethren.

Those, however, who must and will have apples "whether or no" this winter will be obliged to pay fancy prices for them on account of their extreme scarcity.

An Evening World reporter who this morning took a trip around the fruit districts of West, Washington and Barclay streets, Park place and other neighboring localities gleaned considerable information regarding prices and the sparse supply of the tempting spheroids.

The Bellflower is one of the tenderest, juiciest, and prettiest apples grown, and yet, for some unaccountable reason, New York and Boston have hitherto turned up their noses at it.

The Missouri crop is steadily increasing, and this year reaches 2,000,000 barrels. There is a great demand for the Missouri apples in Chicago, but nearly the entire supply is shipped to Suspension Bridge.

Two-thirds of Niagara's output are Greenings and Baldwins, the staple article of the metropolitan market, but where there are one hundred barrels of Greenings last year, an unusually scarce season, there is not a barrel this fall.

This limited supply will probably be exhausted before Christmas, at the extravagant price of \$4.75 to \$6 a barrel for Greenings, while Michigan-grown Baldwins, State stock, which are hardly equal to the New York product, bring \$3.75 to \$4.50.

Dealers generally are of the opinion that no kind of genuine apples will be sold this winter at less than \$4.50 per barrel, in large lots, on the pier.

New England's crop was insufficient for home consumption, and in company with New York, Eastern cities are crying this year for Western apples.

Michigan, Southern Illinois and Missouri will contribute largely to New York's supply this year, and several new varieties of apples, hitherto little known and therefore not popular here, are to be found.
