The United States Rolling Stock Company, of Chicago, Goes Under.

GOULD NOW HAS ATCHISON.

Stocks on the Rise Today, and No Wall Street Failure.

The failure of the United States Rolling Stock Company, of Chicago, with liabilities of \$4,000,000 was announced in Wall street just before noon today.

This company was a competitor of the Pullman Company in the building of freight cars, and it is said that the failure was due to an attempt to do too large a business for its capital, which was \$2,000,000.

The news did not affect the stock market here, which closed as strong as it was weak last Saturday at the high water mark for the day.

The stock market opened this morning at a higher range of prices all round.

The news from abroad was in every respect encouraging and tended to strengthen confidence.

It is evident that London has begun to experience a decided reaction from the gloom and depression which so recently prevailed there, and the improvement in the prices of all American securities, as shown by the special cables this morning, was more marked than had been anticipated.

The leading shares were from 2 to 8 points higher yesterday, with a strong and active market.

The plans of Mr. Gould are more than ever the subject of lively interest and speculation among Wall street operators, and his relation to the control of the Union Pacific is regarded as the most sensational development of the week.

She replied that she desired to secure a room, and would be obliged if the gentleman would conduct her to the clerk's desk.

Proprietor Peed escorted her to the hotel desk, at which Manager Case was presiding, and introduced her.

Then, as he turns to leave, he heard her say: "I would like to secure the highest room in the hotel. I am troubled with palpitation of the heart and would like to be away from all excitement."

She was attired in dark clothing and wore a rich looking sash.




DOGGING A TACKLE. The team looking doggedly at each other. The team for Yale.




A PAIN-BACK. The centre of the field and glare across at the representatives of the rival University.


WILLIAMS. Williams catches it in the middle of the field. Yale forms a V and Williams gains five yards.








