

LAST EDITION. WENT LATE IT. The State Railroad Commission Reports on the Tunnel Disaster.

Smoke and Steam Should be Cleared Out of It at Once. A Daily Menace to the Lives of Passengers Riding Through the Tunnel.

The report of the State Railroad Commission on the cause of the Fourth Avenue tunnel accident is completed and has been made public. It finds that the tunnel in its present condition is dangerous to life and that immediate remedies should be applied.

As regards the ventilation of the tunnel, the board thinks a plan both feasible and desirable is to entirely close the openings between the center and side tunnels and construct ventilating towers at certain points from the side tunnels in such a manner as to produce a strong draft through the side tunnels, ridding them of smoke and steam.

In the most recent report, the board recommends that certain measures should be adopted, and that immediately, to prevent the possibility of a recurrence of such an accident. It recommends that every means be adopted by the railroad companies using the tunnel to improve the present system.

The ending of the smoke nuisance from the tunnel, however, would rescue the avenue from the possibility of being lined with tenement houses and would make it one of the most desirable residential streets in the city."
