The market had a sharp spurt around mid-day. Lackawanna jumped 1 1/2 to 139 1/2; American Sugar advanced from 88 to 90, and National Cordage sold up to 94, and 100 1/2 for common and preferred respectively.

Everything else improved 1/4 to 1/2 per cent., and for a time speculation was buoyant. The rise induced fresh realizations, and there was a reaction on the announcement that the net earnings of the Harrington & Quincy for March decreased 83 1/2.

The annual meeting of the Union Pacific Railroad was held in Boston today. The report of Union Pacific proper (1,821 miles) for 1890 shows a surplus of \$1,886,000 against \$2,402,440 in 1889, a decrease of \$516,440.

The system (8,075 miles) shows a deficit of \$275,000, against a surplus in 1889 of \$675,728. The accounts of the system have been changed, as last year the surplus reported was \$1,144,904. The gross freight debt is \$21,145,000.
