At the age of three make milk the staff of life and begin to arrange a three-meal diet, with fruit, nuts, bread and milk.

Give him nothing for breakfast but a cereal and vary it three or four times a week.

Don't let him have a mouthful of hot pan-cakes, hot muffins or soda biscuits unless you want to irritate his bowels.
