FATAL BULLETS FOR TWO.

John Kausch Kills Sweetheart and Self at Lawrences.

Double Tragedy of Early Morning Upon a Public Street.

Lawrence, Mass., June 30.—John Kausch, a weaver employed in the Washington Mills and thirty years old, this morning shot and killed Mrs. Maria Burchell, daughter of Henry Burchell, of Millard street, a beautiful girl of eighteen.

The tragedy occurred in Union street at about 7 o'clock.

Rausch and the girl have kept company with each other about two years, but for certain causes Rausch became impressed with the idea that his affection was not fully reciprocated.

This morning he left his home at 137 Jackson street, armed with a 30-caliber revolver of the American bulldog make.

While Mrs. Burchell was on the way to her work he met her near the north corner of Garden and Union streets, and, drawing his revolver, shot her through the heart.

She managed to go a few feet away, falling into the arms of Michael Cleary, who was standing near by.

Rausch then pointed the revolver at his left breast and discharged the weapon, falling dead on the sidewalk.

The bodies of both were taken to No. 2 Engine House, in Garden street, where they were viewed by the medical examiners.

District Schemists that Keep Tammany Leaders Awake Nights.

Rumors of Inharmonious Feelings in the Dock Board.

Though Tammany Hall's Committee of Twenty-four has declared that it is the most harmonious political body in existence, its leaders will, politicians say, find it difficult to "get together" the warring factions in the second district.

Anti-Tammanyites say that in the First District they find old and faithful followers of the machine threatening revolt because the only good place given to the district recently was that of deputy sheriff, and that was given to Democrat Fitzgerald to a renegade Tammany Democrat, ex-Assemblyman Daniel E. Finn.

The bitterness is intensified, because it is claimed that Finn has been promised the Assembly nomination.

In the Second District "Dry Dollar" Sullivan is known to have aspired to the leadership, and Police Justice River is not likely to forgive him.

"Tim," it is said, may become an independent candidate, and possibly will receive assistance from ex-Alderman William P. Kirk, who, since the indictment against him was dismissed, proposes to reassert himself as a political candidate.

In the Third District ex-Assemblyman Monahan resents having been thrown over by Judge O'Reilly for Percival Farquhar, and is expected to have his revenge, assisted by his old County Democratic friends and the old Tammanyites who have been getting nothing out of the new Democratic "beastie" leader.

An upheaval is also predicted in the Fourth District, where the Tammanyites have the Tammany nomination for senator.

Assemblyman Roche will revolt, and much can be heard of the "beastie" leader, who is understood to be a movement on foot to supersede him as leader by appointing Percival Farquhar.

Ryan would be leader in name, but ex-Alderman Thomas Shanks, of the Second District, would be the leader for practical purposes.
