

AVERAGE CIRCULATION OVER 300,000 PER DAY. LAST EDITION. MR. GREENER'S SALARY CUT. The Grant Monument Committee Tired of Paying It.

Mr. Greener Says He Will Hold the Fort and Remain Secretary. At its last regular meeting, held on July 6, the executive committee of the Grant Monument Association voted to pay no more money to its secretary after the end of this month.

Since the organization of the Association Prof. Richard T. Greener has been its secretary, and for a year or more past has been drawing a salary of \$200 per month. This is more than the Association is able to pay, according to a prominent member of the Executive Board, and the necessity of economy becoming apparent, it was resolved to stop off Mr. Greener's salary.

Mr. Greener has a comfortable little office on the fifth floor of 140 Broadway, where he is occasionally to be found. He was there this morning when the EVENING WORLD reporter called on him. "I have no intention of resigning, especially when I believe that the action of the Executive Committee was illegal and unauthorized. The matter is one which should come up before the board of directors, and I do not think they will ratify this action of a clique, which has been trying to get me out for some time past."

NOT FOUND IN THE STREET. McKnight Was Taken to Bellevue from an East Side House. Only After an Autopsy Will Any One Know How He Died.

The report that Lucius L. McKnight, a wealthy St. Louis merchant, was found Wednesday night lying on the sidewalk at an insensible condition at Lexington avenue and East Twenty-fifth street appears upon investigation this morning to be incorrect.

Dr. Everett S. Warner, of 117 East Twenty-sixth street, took McKnight to Bellevue Hospital Wednesday night at 8 o'clock. McKnight was placed in ward 25. Dr. Warner and Knight examined him, but could find no external injuries.

Dr. Warner was seen at his office by an Evening World reporter. To questions he replied: "I will say nothing about this case. I always make it a rule to keep my mouth tightly closed on all cases that come under my care. Persistent questioning brought out the fact that McKnight was taken to Bellevue Hospital at 11 o'clock on Wednesday night. The physician was summoned hurriedly Wednesday evening to some house on Lexington avenue, and he found McKnight lying on the floor of East Twenty-fifth street."
