PRODUCING AERATED WATER. Natural Carbonic Acid Gas Brought from Eifel Volcano.

In the neighborhood of the extinct Eifel volcano, near the Rhine, in Germany, says Chamber's Journal, are found springs of mineral waters which give off large volumes of natural carbonic acid gas.

This natural gas becomes thoroughly purified in passing up through some two or three hundred feet of water, which, of course, means a considerable pressure upon the gas.

The apparatus consists simply of a closed copper vessel of any required size, nearly filled with ordinary pure water and connected with a tube of compressed gas.

On turning a tap on the table the liberated gas rushes under high pressure into the copper vessel, becomes thoroughly incorporated with the water, and produces forthwith the aerated mineral water which is so largely consumed and so justly appreciated at the present day.
