FOREIGN NEWS OF THE DAY.

Significant French Expressions as to a Russian Alliance.

Price and Archduchess Renounce Claims to a Throne.

Paris, Nov. 20.—Notwithstanding the semi-official denial which came from Versailles yesterday of the report that the object of M. de Giers, the Russian foreign minister, in visiting Paris was to conclude a treaty of alliance between his government and that of France, the *Parisian*, which is the organ of the French press, publishes an article this morning which shows that it is not paper's belief that that alone is the reason for the Russian minister's visit.

The *Parisian* appeals to all Frenchmen to silence their discord during M. de Giers's stay in Paris. It says: "We are all agreed as to the advantage to be derived from an alliance with Russia. Some day, perhaps, such an alliance will restore to us the integrity of our territory and power."

Titles to a Throne Renounced Amid Brilliant Ceremonials. Vienna despatch says that an imposing ceremony took place at the Hofburg yesterday in the presence of the Royal family, the Ministers and the Cardinal Archbishop, the occasion being the formal renunciation by Archduchess Louise, of Tuscany, and Prince Frederick Augustus, of Saxony, of their titles to the throne, prior to their marriage.

After the banquet all proceeded to the Opera-House, where a gala performance of "Lohengrin" was given.

Cars Plunge from a Viaduct on a South American Railway. Buenos Ayres, Nov. 20.—On the Buenos Ayres and Ensenada Railway today a train was crossing a high viaduct, which carries the line across a deep gorge, when one of the carriages jumped from the rails, dragging the other after it. The whole train was derailed.

Movement to Stop Time Bargain Speculation on German Bourses. Berlin, Nov. 20.—A motion supported by the Conservative party was presented to the Reichstag today demanding that the Government introduce a bill placing the Bourse under the control of the State, and rendering persons who gamble on time bargains, especially in articles of consumption, liable to criminal prosecution.

Britain's Behring Sea Arbitration. Ottawa, Nov. 20.—It is learned that information has been received here that either the Emperor of Germany or the President of the Swiss Confederation will be asked by the British Government to represent Great Britain in the Arbitration Committee to be appointed to settle the Behring sea question.

The Czar Anxious to Choose a New Minister of Finance. London, Nov. 20.—The Vienna correspondent of the *Times* says he is informed that it is a fact that the Czar is only waiting for a chance to choose a successor to M. Vishnegradski as Minister of Finance.

Bay State Official Visitors. A Massachusetts legislative committee comes to New York. The Special Joint Registration Committee on Land Titles of the Massachusetts Legislature, consisting of three Senators and five Representatives, arrived in the city this morning, and are stopping at the Fifth Avenue Hotel.


