M'GLORY'S TRIAL PUT OFF.

Col. Fellows Procures an Adjournment for a Week.

Meantime the Irving Place Dive is to Be Locked and Barred.

Judge Martine set down the trial of Billy McGlory peremptorily for to-day. There was to be no postponement, no adjournment of the trial, and it was set down in Recorder Smith's calendar.

Billy McGlory was to defend himself on the specific charge of keeping a dive at Fourteenth street and Irving place, where Robert Wiener was robbed by Annie Williams of all the money in his pockets, as well as his gold watch and jewelry.

McGlory, passive and humble as usual, answered to Part II of the Court of general Sessions ten minutes after his name had been called by Clerk Hall.

The Recorder scowled at the respondent in a forbidding way. He asked for McGlory's lawyer, but no lawyer replied, and McGlory himself was dumb.

Five minutes later Congressman Col. John R. Fellows hurried in. He approached the Recorder's desk and said: "Your Honor, I am counsel for McGlory, but I cannot try the case to-day. I must be in Washington at the assembling of Congress to-morrow, but I can try it Thursday."

Assistant District Attorney Maclean had said that he would consent to no postponement, but District Attorney Nicoll joined the group and Col. Fellows protested. "This is not all Hoyer owes the Company," said President Sanford, "but it is all we could get out of him. It is possible that in time the value of these properties will increase so that we may realize the full amount of his indebtedness from the sale of them."

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THE DEAD SENATOR PLUMB.

His Body Taken to the Marble Room at the Capitol.

Life of a Saturday Night Party, Lifeless Sunday Morn'g.

Washington, Dec. 21.—The body of the late Senator Plumb of Kansas, who died suddenly of apoplexy yesterday, was removed to the capitol at 10 o'clock this morning.

The town is still profoundly stirred by the Senator's death. It came like a bolt out of the blue. He was of such giant proportions and so indefatigable in the pursuit of all his ends that not even the few who knew that he had recently been seeking medical aid were prepared for so tragic an end.

He had just returned from Philadelphia, where Dr. Pepper had told him he must have a change in his mode of living and take rest, and yet he went straight from the train to Chamberlain's and spent four hours with friends at a dinner given in honor of Gen. Mahone.

Mr. Plumb himself could not have been made to understand that he was in any kind of danger.

It was after midnight when the party broke up, and nearly two o'clock when the Senator retired. Then came the death stroke. He had snored the strained chord, and the doctor's warning was fulfilled.

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WAS HATCH ELECTROCUTED?

Deputy Coroner Jenkins Says He Died of Natural Causes.

Other Physicians Say the Fireman Was Shocked to Death.

A good deal of controversy and unfavorable comment has grown out of the investigation into the cause of the death of Matthew Hatch, a fireman in the employ of the East River Electric Light Company, at 421 East Twenty-fourth street.

Hatch's dead body was found in the fire-truck under an arc light on Thursday. Except Justice Kelly, in one of the principal stockholders of this company.

The peculiar methods of favoritism prevailing in the Coroner's office, and in which Deputy Coroner William T. Jenkins figures conspicuously, are alleged to have been brought into action again in this case.

Hatch lived with his wife and child at 316 East Thirty-third street. The day after his body was taken home Dr. Jenkins performed an autopsy on it.

He certified that the man died from congestion of the lungs and kidneys and enlargement of the heart.

Mrs. Hatch was astounded to learn that her husband had died from this complication of diseases without ever having been ill a day.

She was dissatisfied with the autopsy and called two physicians, who made an examination of the body.

These physicians declared that the heart-ventricle had been enlarged, and that there was evidence of disease in the other organs, which they expressed an opinion that death was due to a heart ailment.

When Dr. Jenkins was seen at his office, 109 East Twenty-sixth street, this morning, he was still unwilling to give up his opinion of his attempt to suppress the suicide of Naval Officer Tillotson on Friday afternoon.

Mrs. Hatch advised a suit against the coroner, but she has not yet filed her charges, very little indicating that he had come into contact with a current of electricity.

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NO CLUE TO THE MURDERER.

All Those Suspected of Killing Mrs. Boschinsky Go Free.

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Simon Feldman, the roofer, who lived on the same floor with the Boschinskys, and Szentanyi Jannos, the Hungarian butcher, were discharged Saturday after proving conclusive alibis.

Max Lemberg, the Boschinskys' former boarder, has also proven an alibi, and this morning he, too, was discharged from custody by Justice Getting in Lee Avenue Police Court.

The poor fellow was slow to realize that he was free, and it was almost necessary to use force to drive him out of the court-room.

Police Capt. Adams admitted this morning that he had nothing whatever left to work upon, but he did not admit that the case had been dropped.

He says that the efforts of the police have been effectually blocked so far by the persistent refusal of the Boschinskys' neighbors to tell what they know of the affair.

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
