Hudson's Executive Committee Reinstates Ray.

SCRIBBS RESTORED TO FAVOR.

Not a Favorite Wins a Purse at the Guttenburg Track.

The Executive Committee of the Hudson County Jockey Club on Saturday reconsidered the case ofockey Harry Ray, who was ruled off for the alleged pulling of the racehorse known as The Sheriff, and very properly reinstated him. When it was announced on Dec. 12 that Ray had been ruled off there was a general expression of surprise among turfmen. There was nothing in the race which the Sheriff ran which gave the Executive Committee the slightest pretext for ruling Ray off, but they did it nevertheless, and it was the universal opinion among racegoers that an injustice had been done.

Ray's friends and THE EVENING WORLD took up his case, feeling that the Committee's action was hardly a fair one. The protest was presented to show that the decision was an unjust one, and the Committee saw the force of the argument. Acting upon advice, Ray addressed a letter to the Executive Committee a few days ago asking for another hearing. The Committee granted it, and on Saturday they reinstated the boy.
