The Process in Detail as Practised by the Best Cooks.

The steak should be purchased from a good butcher. It should be the sirloin cut, with the bone removed.

Two or three hours before cooking the steak mix a tablespoonful of olive oil with a teaspoonful of salt and a quarter teaspoonful of pepper.

Put the steak in a broiler and place the broiler over a hot fire.

Finally, serve promptly on a hot platter with water-cress; put no butter, salt or pepper on the steak.

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
