FIGHT FOR THE CONVENTION. New York's Claims Before the National Democratic Committee. Hundreds of Boomers to Go to Washington To-morrow.

No half-hearted booming will characterize the action of New York City Democrats to secure the Democratic Convention to be held in this city.

Although the National committee does not meet until Thursday, New York's representatives are already in Washington, the place of meeting, working among the National committee men who are on the ground.

To-morrow afternoon the committee of one hundred representative Tammany men, appointed for the purpose, will go to Washington, and the committee named by the Democratic Club to urge the selection of New York for the Convention city is expected to leave at the same time.

Word comes from Washington that the choice seems to be between Milwaukee and New York, and the enthusiastic boomers have faith in their ability to turn the scale in favor of the Knickerbocker.

Information was received in this city to-day of the death at Jacksonville, Fla., of James M. Brookfield, father of William Brookfield, Chairman of the Republican State Committee and President of the Republican Central Committee.

Mr. Brookfield left for Florida Friday night, and as he will probably be absent from the city next Thursday evening, when the 1892 Republican county committee is announced to meet in Grand Opera House Hall for organization, it was said today that the organization of the committee may be postponed.
