AN ENGINE BLOWN UP. STOLE \$60,000. SEEN BY PARKHURST.

Five Men Injured by a Locomotive Boiler Explosion. One Has Died, Other Have Slender Chances of Life.

The Accident Occurred in a Railroad Yard at Long Island City.

(SPECIAL TO THE EVENING WORLD.) LONG ISLAND CITY, April 6.—The boiler of locomotive No. 48, of the Long Island Railroad, exploded in the railroad yard in this city, near the drawbridge, at 9:30 o'clock this forenoon, totally wrecking the engine and terribly injuring five men, one of whom is dead and others in a dangerous condition.
