

TIME LOST ON THE "L."

It Took One Brooklynite Fifteen Minutes to Go a Few Blocks.

I am also of the opinion that two things are the most important to overcome if the Company would adopt two or three of the ideas already suggested in THE EVENING WORLD, which are: First, to run through trains from Fulton Ferry to East New York; second, place plain signs in a conspicuous position on the engine of each train, showing its destination, and third, a bridge at Navy street across the tracks, so that passengers can transfer to the Fifth avenue line without being compelled to ride to Bridge street and pull their way down the stairs.
