EXTRA. THE TORY. Jockey Martin's Wonderful Improvement in Riding. BUNKER HILL A WILD RUNNER. Servia Apparently Getting Stale—Gossip of the Track.

Jockey Martin's riding has improved wonderfully since the opening of the meeting at North Bergen. He is fast getting rid of his riding, and it really is because of comparison with poorer jockeys, or because he has mounts on the best horses. Certain it is, however, that he is doing great work for Eugene Leigh. His record yesterday was three winning mounts, and scarcely a day passes that Martin does not land at least one unnecessary punishment on the jockey regarded as the best manager on the track.

Eugene Leigh, by the way, explains Irregular's defeat a few days ago very plausibly. He told the writer that Clay on Aerial interfered with Irregular throughout, and capped the climax by carrying him wide at the head of the stretch. Martin saw then that he could not win and that it would be indicating unnecessary punishment on the horse if he tried to get up. Leigh says he was very much disappointed that day. The boy CLAY is most incompetent, and will some day be the cause of an accident. Then the officials may set him down.

The racing yesterday was an improvement over that of the past few days. There were no dazzling changes of form, the best horse winning the majority of the races. Bob Arthur was, of course, an exception, but his win was a fluke. Blackburn stumbled on the far turn, and in the stretch was interfered with. When he got through he came very fast, but Arthur only winning by a neck and half length. Bob Arthur was at 30 to 1, and, of course, lucky Tom Egan had bet on him.

It was a mystery why Zenobia was so strongly placed in the third race yesterday. She is not very good, but she has a decided aversion to going a step beyond five furlongs.

Servia came very near losing the first race yesterday. She only got home by a narrow margin, dying like a dog in the lead fifty yards. She is evidently getting stale and will be beaten by the first fair class sprinter she stacks up against.

Fitzroy will do to bet on when next out. He got away poorly, but made up a lot of ground, and was closing very fast in a wild race. Had the race been at five furlongs he would have won.

The most remarkable performance on the track yesterday was that of Bunker Hill. This colt ran away at least a mile from the rest of the field, and was only beaten by a nose for the place. He will only be a bet on his next start.

Calcedonia was heavily backed in the city pools yesterday. The talent kept crying, 'When until he stacks up against a good horse; then he'll know he's racing.' Yesterday he was backed several good horses, and was badly beaten. He finished last. He ran in his old form for five furlongs, and this proved a very easy fashion. Fitzroy was the race won, but an excellent race was had. He was backed from 20 to 1 to 10 to 1 on the strength of a six-furlong trial in I. G. He will make some of the cracks get up and move before long.

Gloster was made an odd on favorite in the last race yesterday, but he had to be hustled hard to win. Old Harry Ireland, after his rest of several months, was in his old form and was a good second.
