EXTRA. 2 O'CLOCK. EYES ON ALBANY.

Republican State Convention in Session to Choose Presidential Convention Delegates.

Platt, Depew, Miller and Hiscock Sure to Be Selected.

Delegates Overwhelmingly Oppose Instructing for Harrison.

Federal Officials Make Vigorous but Futile Protests.

Formal Action of the Convention to Be Deferred Till an Evening Session.

Men gathered here are defeated candidates when the Man of Maine is mentioned in private conversation.

The State feeling is not unanimous, though, even among the anti-Harrison men here, and there may be heard a delegate talking in the language of 1884 when Blaine is the topic, and it is plain that while the Secretary is the most prominent Republican in the party in session to-day, there is still much of the old opposition to him with the masses, and he continues to receive the unanimous support of the party were he to be, in spite of himself, and what his daughter calls his "noted illness," the Republican candidate next fall.

Mr. Depew, who declared for Harrison's re-nomination in a New York interview last Tuesday, is very reticent, and he betrays the relation of a funny story every time any one opens the subject.

An Evening World reporter this morning interviewed the chairman of thirty-six delegations outside of New York and Kings counties, representing nearly two-thirds of the delegates from the country districts. Without exception they declared themselves opposed to an instructed delegation to Minneapolis.

The New York delegation is for an uninstructed delegation.

The opposition is not based, at least directly, on a firm, drilling rain. As the morning wore on the rain ceased, but heavy clouds hung over the ancient city of the Knickerbockers, the wind freshened and the air became chilly. The weather was altogether disagreeable.

Keeping pace with the weather, the spirits of the little band of faithful officeholders whose aim in the seems to be to shout for Harrison, went down, down, down. They had been very busy during the late hours of last night. They button-holed every new arrival to the city, and they urged a consistency, and declared that it would be a precious jewel for the Republican party of New York to wear. "Consistency" meant to them a thorough endorsement of Mr. Harrison's administration and candidacy. They demanded the adoption of a resolution of instruction to the delegates to the Minneapolis Convention, to vote for President Harrison's re-nomination.

But Thomas C. Platt said no. Senator Hiscock echoed the word faintly, adding that "Republican delegates should be free men."

Then the little band of devoted Harrisonites made a bold dash for the speakers' stand. They began by industriously working up a boom for ex-Mayor Schroeder, of Brooklyn, in the place of Mr. Hiscock on the slate.

This scheme seemed to work nicely at first, but the boom was exploded in an attempt to swap horses while the steed was running. The speakers' stand was crowded, and concluding that Schroeder might be used to crush Boss Platt himself.

Naval Officer Theodore B. Willis was the chief player in this game, and he backed ostentatiously by the rest of the Administration men from Brooklyn. A count of noses, however, led to the discovery that Schroeder was a resolution instructing for Harrison, would only result in a more complete exposure of the weakness of the President in his party in this State.

Their best orators were unable to count more than fifteen Harrison men among the sixty-eight National delegates who, by the Congressional district conventions, had become convinced that a Harrison resolution would get the support of hardly more than one-sixth of the delegates in today's convention, and so the boast of Commodore Willis, that because a treaty, as time wore on to the effect that he would force the Convention to endorse the President because a plaintiff "why not?"

A PRELIMINARY INDIGNEMENT ONLY.

While the Convention is overwhelming against him there is no disposition on the part of the delegates to sit down hard on the President, and if his frantic supporters here do not make any rash breaks the Convention will endorse the Administration, ignoring the subject of instruction to delegates.

If the Harrison contingent should become belligerent, however, it will be mercilessly snuffed, and possibly Blaine resolutions will be submitted, in order to give the 777 mostly Hays-throated delegates an opportunity to show how they would behave if they were putting the match to a powder magazine, for the mournful tones of the

SKIRMISHING BEFORE THE BATTLE.

ALBANY, April 28.—As had been predicted in THE EVENING WORLD, the State committee easily agreed on the choice of Judge William E. Sutherland, of Rochester, as temporary Chairman of the Convention and Whitehall being elected by the county district.

Only one contesting delegation vexes the soul of the leaders—led from Seneca County. The trouble there is not, however, regarded important.

Democrats in town are greatly amused by the fact that, despite the vigorous denunciations now being made by the Congressional re-nomination enacted by the just-dissolved Legislature, the Republican State committee decided to organize for the coming canvass on the basis of the new districts. The appointment was recognized for the purpose of party reorganization. It explains the fact that the counties of Seneca, Hamilton and Albany will in all probability control the Republican organization, a state of things which is so vigorously condemned in the Democratic party—in other words, that the localities which cast Republican majorities are dominated by those which are hopelessly Democratic.

The committee, speaking for their delegation, said they favored the "Big Four," Platt, Hiscock, Miller and Depew, so that their election as delegates-at-large is insured. They all endorsed the sentiments of the resolutions and the platform, an outline of which appears in these despatches this morn.

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IN CHIEF PLATT'S ROOM.

REFLECT TO THE EVENING WORLD.

ALBANY, April 28.—"All roads lead to Rome," rules the saw, and the road of all the delegates led sooner or later to the rooms occupied by the Hon. Thomas C. Platt, of the great Levee Hotel in Parkers 420 and 451 at the Delavan House.

Here the other leaders who, with Mr. Platt, make up the New York Republican "Big Four," were closeted in secret conference until near daylight this morning.

They had their heads together over a document which Mr. Platt had prepared for the committee on resolutions to present in its turn as the platform of the party to be adopted by the convention. The document which completed will consist of six typewritten pages.

Mr. Platt said that the platform reaffirmed the principle of the Republican party—that was all. But it looked out that attached to the platform were four resolutions, the presentation of which was in a manner contingent upon developments today. These resolutions condemn free silver currency, denounce the action of the Legislature in the National convention of New York in the National Convention, provided that none of the "Big Four" delegates-at-large is turned down by the convention this evening, will stand as follows:
