

FOR LATER CONCERTS.

The Proposed Change at East River Park Meets with Favor.

Commissioner Nathan Straus Says the Request is Reasonable.

The Park Board Expected to Take Favorable Action Wednesday.

The proposition to change the hour for the evening concerts in East River Park from 8 o'clock in the afternoon to 10 o'clock in the evening has attracted general attention and elicited much favorable comment since the residents of the neighborhood enthusiastic over the plan, but at least one Park Commissioner has been convinced that the concerts, if given in the evening, would please hundreds where they now please one.

The proposition lastly commends itself to the fair-minded people. The park was created for the benefit and enjoyment of the residents in the neighborhood. These are almost entirely working people. The music is a feature that has been added to enhance the attractiveness of the park as a free pleasure resort for the people.

It is the general opinion among those living in the vicinity of East River Park that the hour for the concerts should be changed to 10 o'clock in the evening. Everybody who desired to hear the concerts would be able to do so. By that time not only are the fathers, sons and daughters home from the shops and factories, but the evening meal has been served and the tired housewives themselves are ready to enter upon a period of rest and enjoyment. Nothing but distinction would then hinder whole families from visiting the park and enjoying the music.

The Board of Park Commissioners is to meet Wednesday morning at 9:30 o'clock, and it is believed that favorable action will then be promptly taken by that body on the proposed change.

In conversation with an EVENING WORLD reporter Commissioner Paul Dana, President of the Board, said: "I can give no opinion whatever on the matter until I have thoroughly considered it."

Commissioner Nathan Straus, however, was more communicative. He said: "I read about this movement in THE EVENING WORLD last Saturday, and it struck me that the arguments advanced in its favor were not only plausible, but forcible, and that the request was a reasonable one. It is just as you say: Most of the people who go to that park are working people, and cannot attend afternoon concerts, because their work will not permit it."

"The music is intended for them, and I don't see why the Board should have at a time when they can hear and enjoy it, of course most of our concerts are given in the afternoon, excepting those at the Battery and, possibly, two or three other parks, but, inasmuch as the people around East River Park cannot attend afternoon concerts, they should be given to them in the evening."

"There is no reason for having the concert in the afternoon that I know of, unless possibly it is a question of expense, but that is a trifling matter. I think that with the advantages, we have a chance that will benefit the masses."

ANOTHER SHOT UNDER WATER.

Within Three Feet of the Mark, but Not Altogether Satisfactory.

The third of the series of submarine gun tests at the Brooklyn Navy-Yard was made this morning. Commander G. A. Converse, Lieut. T. C. McLean and C. A. Hendry, who constitute the Experimental Board, were seated on hand.

Today's experiment was made with a projectile 20 feet 4 inches long and weighing 1,600 pounds. It was of the same buoyancy as those used in the previous test. Twenty-five pounds of sphere-capped powder was used.

Commander Converse gave the signal to fire at 10:45 o'clock. The first indication that the charge had been fired was when the hydrographer observed a slight rise about five feet, owing to the recoil of the gun.

Then the water twenty feet in front of the gun churned and heaved, and a few seconds later the projectile appeared on the surface of the water at the lower end of the dry dock, 300 feet from the gun.

Examination showed that the projectile had passed through the first net, which was at a distance of 100 feet from the muzzle of the gun, and had after that passed entirely under the other five nets stretched across the course.

Commander Converse said that the experiment was a good one so far as the time was concerned. It had passed under the nets and had not exploded until it struck the fifth net, where the torpedo appeared at the end of the range was within three feet of the mark at which it was aimed.

Another shot was fired late this afternoon when it is said that a projectile with an automatic steering attachment will be used.

BLOODHOUNDS IN THE CHASE.

A circle of forty or fifty miles, around the scene of crime is now fully covered by men and officers, who confidently expect to capture the criminals before another twenty-four hours pass.

MORE PERIL FROM FLOODS.

Fresh and Growing Break in a Levee Above New Orleans.

Homeless Families in the West—Heroic Remedies at Ottumwa.

New Orleans, May 22.—A crevasse occurred at 8 o'clock last night on the Power place, three miles below Chalmette, and seven miles below the Seila crevasse of last season. This is regarded as the most serious break that has occurred in the levees of the lower Mississippi this season.

The water from it will overflow a large part of St. John Baptist parish and greatly damage the Mississippi Valley Railroad.

The break is about eight feet high, but seventy-five feet back from the bank line, and the water is free from willows or other growth to lessen the current of the inflow.

The crevasse was caused by a crawfish hole. A 10 o'clock last night the break was forty feet wide. About one hundred men have been collected from neighboring places, and Judge Ross, who owns Hester, one mile above, has sent his whole plantation force to the scene.

No material is on hand, however, and it is hardly possible that anything can be done. It is being regarded as a matter of life and death.

Little Rock, Ark., May 22.—A telegram has been received from Castoria, thirty miles from this city, stating that 1,500 men, women and children are waterbound and asking for help.

The Relief committee will forward a special train of provisions this morning to a camp at the lower point on the Valley Railroad, where a steambait will be in waiting to collect supplies and distribute them to the sufferers.

DEEMING'S DEATH A RELIEF.

Melbourne Public and the Jail Officials Breathe More Freely.
