

KILLED IN A STATION HOUSE.

Policeman Bob Drummond Falls Down a Steep Stairway.

Another Victim of Improperly Built Station-House Steps.

Policeman Robert E. Drummond, of the Charles street station, died this morning at St. Vincent's Hospital from injuries received by falling down the stairs at the Charles street station house.

Drummond had been on duty at a mission meeting at 605 Washington street last night, and returned to the station shortly after 9 o'clock.

The stairs from which Drummond fell is very steep, with narrow steps winding around an open space about four feet square.

Drummond was twenty-four years old and had been on the force twelve months. He was to appear before the Police Commission next Wednesday to answer five charges; three of being absent without leave, one of being found in a liquor store, while on duty and one of not patrolling his beat properly.

It was reported that he was intoxicated last night, but this is denied by Sgt. Naughton, who was on duty at the time of the accident.

Sgt. McCordick, who saw Drummond last night, also says he was not intoxicated. Drummond's home was at 553 East Tenth street. He leaves a widow and young child. He was known as "Pretty Bob."

DEAD CHILDREN IN TITUSVILLE.

Two More Bodies Found - Militiamen Still Kept on Guard.

TITUSVILLE, Pa., June 10.-Workmen excavating in the ruins of the Binghamier Building found the bodies of two children, one of a boy of eight years, partly burned, and the other the remains of a young child. They were Jacob Binghamier's youngest children. Two bodies were buried in mistake by Binghamier, who lost his wife and eight children. The members of Company K, Sixteenth Regiment, are still on duty, and as large numbers of suspicious characters are coming to town it is likely they will be kept on duty for some time.

Large quantities of provisions are arriving by express from Philadelphia and Harrisburg. Bedding and clothing are still badly needed.

SIXTEEN PROBABLY KILLED.

Dreadful Explosion in a Coal Pit Near Miesbach.

MEXICO, June 10.-On Wednesday an explosion occurred in a coal pit near Miesbach, a mining town sixteen miles southwest of this city.

Sixteen of the miners were caught and buried in the falling debris. There is believed to be not the slightest chance of any of them being rescued alive.

FIVE STORIES OF FLAME.

Panic in a Big Tenement Caused by an Outbreak of Fire.

Some of the Inmates Rescued with Much Difficulty.

Fire broke out fifteen minutes before 6 o'clock this morning in the five-story flat house at 122 West Fifteenth street.

There was much excitement among the tenants, several of whom narrowly escaped death. Three alarms were sent in.

Three of the ten suits of apartments were vacant. The rest were occupied as follows: First floor, Miss Edwards and Miss Bachelor; second floor, Joseph Marsh; third floor, Miss Blanche Brown; fourth floor, Miss Corday and Miss Richardson. Edward Johnson lived on the fourth floor. The janitor, John Crumley, had apartments on the fifth floor.

The fire started on the stairs just above the ground floor and was evidently caused by some one dropping a lighted cigarette on the carpet. It spread rapidly, and by the time the flames arrived the flames were shooting through the roof.

About the first one to discover the outbreak was Mrs. Cunnery, wife of the janitor. She had just arisen, when she saw smoke coming up through the air-shaft in the rear. She called her husband, and they fled for their lives, shouting "Fire!" as they went.

About the same time a column of flame shot through the roof from the stairs and burned up twenty feet above the roof. Mrs. Crumley became hysterical, and her cries were heard by some of the women downstairs.

Miss Bachelor, on the second floor, was the first to hear them and she awakened Miss Edwards in the apartment above hers. Miss Edwards, on the third floor, also heard the alarm. Then the cry of fire rang through the house and great excitement prevailed.

There was some delay in sending out the alarm, and when the firemen came and broke open the front door the stairs and halls were ablaze from the ground floor up to the roof.

It was impossible for any one to get out except by the front door. The fire-escapes in their right clothes. Capt. Shaw and his men had much difficulty in getting some of the women to venture upon the fire-escapes.

Capt. Shaw himself carried down from the third floor a man who was not hurt. All hands got out safely. Some suffered from the smoke but they quickly recovered. Miss Richardson was occupied a flat on the fourth story, was slightly burned on the face.

The janitor's wife had a narrow escape. Her husband assisted her over to the roof of the next house, which is six feet lower than the building that was burning.

In climbing down she fell and landed on top of a skylight over a shaft, smashing in the glass. She grabbed hold of the framework and saved herself from a fall to the bottom of the shaft.

A woman who was visiting some one in the house and had a child with her was helped out by the firemen.

The fire burned through every story, gutting all the apartments. The fire was not under control for an hour. The loss to tenants and on building is about \$20,000. John Crumley reported to the police that he had been robbed during the progress of the fire of some money and a valuable watch and chain.
