IT'S A HOT BUNKER HILL DAY. POISONED BY CANNED BEEF. 86 Per Cent. of Humidity with 85 Degree of Caloric. Twenty-five Persons Very Ill at Raritan, N. J.

Local Forecast Official Dunn's predicted warm weather on this morning. The thermometer registered at 8 o'clock this morning 73 degrees, and the young gentlemen of the weather bureau ventured the opinion that while the temperature would not exceed 85 degrees today, the weather would be almost insufferable because of the 80 per cent. of humidity in the atmosphere, which knocked out any cooling effect that might have been looking in the fourteenth degree that was blowing from the southwest.

Down on the street the temperature was much higher. Perry's thermometer opened the ball at 3 o'clock this morning with 72 degrees for a starter. At 6 o'clock it had warmed up to 78, at 8 o'clock, at 10 o'clock, and at 11 o'clock, with the naturally hottest part of the day to come.

The record was practically a reproduction of that of a year ago to-day, when the thermometer marked 84 degrees at 12 o'clock, noon.

In the cool breeze of yesterday New Yorkers forgot that just a year previous 1891 had its hottest day, when Perry's thermometer marked the day's record at 84 degrees. The forecast for to-morrow is for clear, cooler weather, with possible light showers between 10 o'clock and 1 o'clock.

The visiting students at Chicago were comfortable in a 90 degree temperature this morning. A slight shower, however, had done some damage to the way point on certain faces. The prospects, however, are for a hot convention, thermometrically, as well as politically.

It is generally warmer all along the Atlantic coast north of Washington to-day. Throughout this State the temperature averaged about 80 degrees, with a high of 82 and a low of 74.

FOUND A TYPHUS CASE. The Disease Developed in a Presbyterian Hospital Patient.

A case of typhus fever has been discovered in the Presbyterian Hospital. The patient is Charles Scott, forty-four years old, who has been in the hospital two weeks. It is said that he had been in the hospital for some time before he was taken down.

At present, inspectors of the health department know very little about his movements since entering the hospital. He was thought to have typhoid fever, but several days ago his symptoms were regarded as suspicious and he was isolated. Yesterday he developed typhus and was removed to Riverside Hospital.

The usual precautions have been taken to prevent any spread of the disease in Presbyterian Hospital. E. Ledwith, thirty-two, of 94 Charlton street, and Henry Ross, forty-five, of 131 Avenue B, were removed to Riverside Hospital, sick with small-pox, to-day.


PERRASSA.
