BROOKLYN FREE BATH NO. 1.

These dressing-rooms are each three by four feet in size and exactly like the pay bath-rooms at Coney Island or Long Beach.

There is a round opening in each door, and an Evening World artist caught a portrait of one youthful bather who coupled the pleasure of watching the other bathers while he hurried into his clothing after a fifteen minute's submergence.

"The bath has a plank bottom and the water is four feet deep," said Keeper McGowan. "The bath rests on pontoons and we are in water that is forty-five feet deep at high tide. The baths are supposed to open June 1 and to remain open till Oct. 1."

WILLIE BEARS LEARNING TO SWIM. Every year, but we did not open this backyard season till June 20, and our customers are making up for lost time, so that we have had to have extra police help keep the youngsters out, and the older, too-in-line on the pier waiting their turn.
