IT'S CHOLERA ABOUT PARIS.

150 Deaths Already from the So-Called "Cholera" in the Suburbs.

London, July 8.—A despatch from Paris to the *Lancet*, the authoritative British medical journal, says: Already 150 deaths prove the character of the cholera epidemic here.

The official Council of Hygiene make a mistake in concealing the facts and resorting to the feeble stratagem of secrecy. The *Lancet* adds that there is no disguising the great extent of the epidemic which is prevailing in twenty-four communes and the suddenness of the deaths.

The *Lancet* concludes: It is cholera, not sholera. CHOLERA'S PROGRESS IN RUSSIA. St. Petersburg, July 8.—Twelve fresh cases of cholera and seven deaths from the disease are reported in Samara.

The disturbances in Astrakhan arising from the fears occasioned by the cholera among the pain-stricken workmen are increasing in violence.

Garret A. Hobart, a member of the Executive Committee in 1888; Joseph H. Manly, Mr. Bailey's lieutenant, is famed as an organizer and tactician; William C. Bradley, Secretary of the National committee in 1884; Henry C. Payne, another Blaine man, has fought many battles for the Republicans in Wisconsin, and is an old Executive Committee man.

M. H. De Young, of California, is Vice Chairman of the National committee. Land Commodore Thomas H. Carter, of Montana, is Secretary, and Cornelius N. Bliss, of New York, is Treasurer. New York has William A. Sutherland as an additional member on the committee.

Who the new National Chairman will be will not be definitely known until the Executive Committee meets. Senator Newell has stated that he would not possibly accept, and the talk centers on Senator Philatus Sawyer, of Wisconsin, who will take Mr. Payne's place if selected by the President, who will, of course, have the privilege of naming his campaign manager.

It is thought that Mr. Carter will continue as Secretary, as he gives no encouragement to the idea, and he generally declines to be interviewed.
