LAST EDITION. HOT FIRE OF DRUGS.

Blaze in Greenwich Street That Blocked Early Ninth Avenue "L" Trains.

Tarrant Co.'s Store Ablaze for the Second Time in a Week.

The Loss in Both Fires Amounts to About \$100,000; Insurance, \$90,000.

A lively blaze in Tarrant & Co.'s big wholesale drug store at Warren and Greenwich streets, furnished plenty of excitement for people on their way to business this morning, and gave the firemen a hard tussle.

This is the second time within a week that the building has been on fire. Last Wednesday night a fire in the third story was burned out, and the fire this morning is supposed to have been caused by sparks that were left to smolder in some out-of-the-way corner.

The establishment occupies three buildings on Greenwich street, Nos. 278, 280 and 282. The first one, on the corner of Warren street, is a three-story brick building. In the lower part of it is the retail drug department, Nos. 280 and 282 are inventory, store-front buildings comprising the wholesale department, the upper floors being stored with boxes and packages of drugs, oils, chemicals and general pharmaceutical supplies.

The value of the buildings and the stock in the entire establishment is estimated at \$500,000, and it is thought that the losses by the two fires may reach \$100,000. According to Cashier George Thompson, who was on the third floor at the time the fire broke out, the flooring under the beams became hot and exploded a cavity of wood. The cashier ran into the office and cried: "For God's sake, boys, run; show us fire again."

While the flames were shooting through all parts of the floor Clerk R. W. Bullock, 41, then years, and William St. John, twenty years old, ran back into the building. Bullock saved the clock pocket, the fire being not far from the clock. The water on the floors was so hot that their feet were paroled.
