LAST EDITION. STILL WE SWELTER. Yet Official Forecaster Dunn Says It Is Cooler.

The Day Opens with Lower Temperature and Higher Humidity. Thermometers Register 90 This Afternoon—Relief Promised.

The multiplicity of umbrellas in the streets of New York to-day was not due to Local Forecaster Dunn's prediction yesterday of possible showers last night or today. A shower materialized and Dunn's forecast was correct.

But the reason for to-day's parachute parade was the ever-growing and legitimate belief that an umbrella is a mighty thing on a hot day and as useful in warding off the sun's rays as in shielding its owner from the beneficent but besetting drops of Jupiter Pluvius.

On the strength of Mr. Dunn's predictions New Yorkers expected a continuance of the hot wave to-day, which Mr. Dunn had scientifically explained would be caused by the blowing of the south winds out of the high into the low pressure, and probably resulting in dingy weather all the week.

Mr. Dunn's prediction, so far as to-day was concerned, was verified, but the clever prophet, with a ten-mile breeze blowing through the south windows of his lookout on top of the Equitable building this morning, modified his views and predictions in a way that will prove fortunate for the city.

While to-morrow, and probably Saturday will be cool, comfortable days hardly that the cool spell will remain over Sunday, by that time it is likely to become warm again, unless another cool wave, not now visible comes in sight.

The cause of to-night's and to-morrow's prospective cool weather is due to the higher pressure coming down from the lake region, where they are having light showers to-day. The wind changing around to the northwest will intensify the cool wave.

SEEKING SMALL-POX CASES. IS IT THE CHOLERA? People in a New Jersey Village Think the Asiatic Scourge Is There.

LAST EDITION. CLEVELAND ON KING.

A Sympathetic Letter to the Memphis Prisoner's Niece. The Writer Had Thought of Interceding for the Condemned.

COL. KING SAFELY REACHES THE STATE PRISON AT NASHVILLE. NASHVILLE, TENN., Aug. 11.—Among the documents filed with Gov. Buchanan in reference to the H. Clay King case is the following:

"I have been so moved by your appeal that I have seriously considered whether there was not something I might do to help you. I am forced to the conclusion, however, that I ought not to interfere by applying to the Governor for the mitigation of the sentence pronounced upon your uncle. Such an application on my part would be based only upon the sympathy which I feel for you and my experience teaches me that such a consideration ought not to control Executive action in cases of this kind.

"Notwithstanding this, I feel that there are circumstances in your uncle's case which ought to appeal strongly to the pardoning power, and I earnestly hope that such representations may be made to your Governor as will avert the execution of the death sentence which has been pronounced. Very truly yours, GUYTON CLEVELAND."
