Gov. Boyd, of Nebraska, Sends to It a Check for \$100—Other Contributions. Omaha, Neb., Sept. 7.—Contributions through World-Herald yesterday and today amounted to \$155.20, making our total to date \$531.11. This includes \$100 from Nebraska's Democratic Governor, James E. Boyd, who wrote this letter:

Dear Sir: It affords me much pleasure to hand you herewith my check for \$100 as my contribution to the Western Campaign Fund which you are raising for legitimate expenditures assisting Democracy to carry the West for tariff reform and economical government. I believe that there are a number of Western States keenly alive to the issue of tariff reform; that if the facts can be properly brought to the attention of the people, the cause of Democracy will thrive. I regret that my means will not permit of my making a larger contribution at this time, but I feel it to be my duty to do this and deem it the duty of every Democrat to do likewise in proportion to his means. Twenty Clubs Contesting.

Increasing Interest Shown in the Race for the Ten Prize Banners.

The political clubs have this week shown more activity than at any previous time during the Presidential campaign, and the prospects are that the next few days will stimulate them all into active participation in the canvass. Twenty important clubs are now participating in the banner contest, which will close the 1st of next month, when the ten silken, gold-fringed banners will be distributed to those subscribing the largest aggregate amounts to the Western Democratic Campaign Fund. The name of the Tammany

Association of the First Assembly District has been added to the list. This is the organization with which Register Frank P. Fitzgerald is identified, and it is one of the strongest of the kind in the city. Mr. Fitzgerald is the only New Yorker who is an ex-congressman without ever having sat in the House of Representatives. That was because he is such a popular man that he was elected to his present position before he had a chance to take his seat at Washington. Under the new apportionment his district now extends to Spring street, west of Broadway from the battery, besides taking in a small portion of the city northward. Here he is all-powerful among the influential residents, and his friends are confident that his management this year will show bigger results than ever before.

Yesterday Mr. Fitzgerald said with an air of confidence that his portion of the city would give a larger majority for Cleveland than any other of the two Presidential election districts which have been sliding rapidly toward Democracy. He therefore appears a substantial contributor to the Western Democratic Campaign Fund. Ex-Alderman Henry Fitzgerald, who appears among the contributors, is another representative Democrat who believes that some of the Western States may be carried by the Democratic vote in the Presidential election. He has organized one of the largest German Cleveland and Stevenson clubs in the city and is one of the most active in the campaign. That club, by the way, will probably be heard from in the banner contest before long.

The Ferdinand Levy Democracy has likewise signified through its officers an intention to come in with a handsome contribution and with one of those ten silk banners. For a new organization there could be no better support than the assistance given to the cause of national Democracy in this Presidential year. A separate account is kept on the bank of the money so sent in and will be reported in these columns from time to time. The other clubs—those which with the ten silk banners will be the ten which stand at the head of the list when the contest is brought to a close, and they will thus achieve a distinction without a parallel in any Presidential election which has heretofore taken place.

The amount of the subscriptions will alone decide the contest. Many of the clubs now in the field are far in advance in the race, and clubs which intend to participate should not waste any time in coming in, but to do so at once. 
